
# In the beginning:


Speaker: Dean Bareham from Green Fools Theatre Society

Dean was introduced by Bob Clark. Dean is the artistic director and co-founder of Green Fools Theatre in Calgary. He began his studies at the Alberta College of Art & Design and then attended the Dell' Arte School of Physical Theatre in Blue Lake, California. For the last twenty-nine years, Dean has been delighting audiences across the globe with his buffoonery and stilt characters; his alter ego, Gustavo the Impossibilist is infamous worldwide. Dean has performed and taught workshops all across Canada, Europe, South America, Macedonia, New Zealand, Lesotho, Japan, and the USA. He has performed with the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra, the National Symphony in Ottawa and with Cirque du Soleil at the Luminato Festival in Toronto.

physical and street theatre, which would feature elaborate costuming and stilt walking and puppetry. They still are entertainers but now they also provide classes in Social Circus. This is an innovative social intervention approach, which uses the circus arts as a tool for fostering the personal and social development of at-risk individuals. It targets various at-risk groups living in precarious personal and social situations. The primary goal of this approach is not merely to learn circus arts. Rather, it's designed to help participants achieve personal and social development by nurturing their self-esteem and trust in others, teaching them social skills, inspiring them to become active citizens, and helping them to express their creativity and explore their potential. Social Circus is a powerful catalyst for creating social change because it helps marginalized people to assume citizenship within a community and enrich that community with their personality. Green Fools Theatre offers workshops to schools and community organizations, and provides free Social Circus outreach programs for at-risk, indigenous, new immigrant, and refugee youth. Just as Covid hit Green Fools was planning to open a school where they were hoping to provide Social Circus programming that students would attend for 3+ weeks. These free outreach programmes are supported by funding from organizations like the Rozsa Foundation and Alberta Foundation for the Arts and also Birdies for Kids.

Bob Clark came back to thank Dean for his presentation. He pointed out that Rotary like the Green Fools values acceptance, empowerment and community.




