Our meeting.

Local businesses can 'sponsor' an intern from outside of their local area to fill a gap in their local talent pool. It's attractive to businesses for several reasons:

- Get high quality talent, where there may be a gap locally
- Interns have high work ethic – motivated to be there from another region
- Intern bring cultural vibrancy to the company they are serving.

Post-secondary students (or those who have completed post-secondary within 2 years) can apply for the Global Talent program to serve within one of the following 4 areas:

- Business Administration
- Marketing
- IT
- Engineering

Based on the algorithm of the Hay's skills index, there are skills gaps in many developed nations, and this program can serve to fill those gaps, as well as create global awareness with those who are impacted (the interns as well as the sponsoring organizations).

There are 24 Universities in Canada affiliated with AIESEC. Joe Klassen was a member from 1985 to 1989, and Jim Coyle's son did an exchange to Ghana with this program. Leighton Fisk thanked the speakers.
