MEMBERSHIP

Brad Sewall, who really wishes his first name was Doug, gave an update on the work of the membership committee. The committee is focusing on three things this year:

- what makes a good member
- what can a new member expect
- making it easier to join

More than 20 club members answered the recent survey about prospective members. The consensus is that we are looking for three things

- people who are aligned with our values (honesty, integrity, service) and our culture (friendly, fun, informal)

- people who buy into Rotary - service above self, the 6 avenues of service - people who contribute to the diversity of the club (vocations, ideas, life experiences, age, gender, ethnicity) To maintain the vibrancy of our club, we need to recruit at least 6-8 new members every year. We don't have a cap or a goal but we know the current size of the club works.

Christine Mihailedes gave us an update on fundraising. We have three major projects this year. We are reviving Give a Fork in February with a goal to raise \$15,000. Ted Wood has taken this on. The Second Chance Art Sale is in April. Bill Skinner and his committee are planning to grow this new event.

Christine needs a new chair for the golf tournament committee. We are evaluating our relationship with the Animal Rehabilitation Foundation and looking at how we can engage the community in this event so we raise more money.

Our ability to contribute to youth, community and international projects depends on the success of these fundraisers.

YOUTH

In Graham Drake's absence, Peter Harding updated us on what the new Youth Committee is doing. In addition to Early Act, Rotary Youth Leadership Award, Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment and Youth Exchange, the committee is looking at how to expand our relationships with the Bridge Foundation for Youth and Bishop Grandin High School.

Peter told us about the impact of two programs. He read a message from the student we sent to Adventures in Citizenship, last spring in Ottawa. We are one of 200 clubs that support this 4-day experience. Peter also introduced Trixie, from Bishop Grandin, who attended RYPEN this year. She told us about what she learned at RYPEN - teamwork, trust and that everyone is dealing with challenges. It is easy to see that RYPEN makes a difference.

In a time when teenagers are lonelier and dependent on digital interaction, Enya told us she's learned that she can make friends. She's making progress on her bucket list.
