# PROGRAM NOTES FOR MARCH 18th, 2016

Our speaker today was Literacy Central Vancouver Island's, **Michele Hillier**.

Ms. Hillier was introduced by club member John Shil-



labeer. Michele has been with the Literacy Central organization since 2012, having come from a background of community social work. Since working with the organization, she

has spearheaded a number of new and innovative literacy-centred endeavours, including several First Nations programs, and the first ever First Nations Literacy Assessment in Canada. Our club knows Michele well, as we have been teaming together on our own fundraising book sales since they began.

Literacy Central Vancouver Island has their head office in downtown Nanaimo, and they operate two second-hand bookstores, 'Well-Read Books', and 'Well-Read Kids'. The front half of the building houses the bookstore, and the remainder is used for a variety of activities such as study and tutoring rooms, book-sorting areas, and offices. The book sorting is done by volunteers, who donate enormous amounts of time and goodwill. Our club's fundraising book sale has also been a beneficiary of many volunteer hours from Literacy. Literacy and Rotary often swap books back and forth when it seems they may be better-suited for sale at one place or the other.

The bookstore is only a funding aspect to Literacy's main purpose, which is to assist and educate semiliterate and illiterate people in our community. People in our society without the ability to read are hugely disadvantaged, and often have no idea where to go for help. Literacy reaches out to many groups including the correctional centres, First Nations bands, and social centres. Free reading assistance and tutoring is offered by volunteers to all who ask. Much literacy tutoring is also done within the school systems. Our Rotary club helped to fund a downtown learning centre, which has since helped hundreds.



A fast-growing area within the program is computer refurbishment and dona-Since begintion. ning this, over 2,000 computers have been donated, including 50 so far already this year. This is proving to be very successful improving the learning process.

Michele concluded by thanking Rotary for all the help, and

said that all are welcome to join the volunteers at their downtown store every Wednesday afternoon at 3 for tea (and, of course, some book sorting).

After several questions from the floor, club member **Wendy Pratt** thanked our speaker for the very interesting and informative program, and said that most people only see the bookstore's front portion, without being aware of the full scope of Literacy's work throughout the city. Wendy mentioned that Michele's work ties in very well with Rotary principles. She then presented Michele with an oak pen handmade by **Allan Smith** as a token of appreciation.



Following the presentation, Charles Ramos fessed up that he had found \$5.00 in a book on sailing that he had purchased from Literacy Central


### **April is Maternal and Child Health Month**
