

Nanaimo Regional Transit Plans for the Future

Charles Ramos introduced our two speakers, Daniel Pearce, Manager of Transit Operations with the Regional District of Nanaimo and Jamie Logan, Superintendent of Planning and Scheduling. They shared with us what they see as the future of transit in the region.

It is a 25 year plan that supports land use plans and the economic, social and environmental sustainability goals of the RDN.

Today, the transit system is comprised of 4 major routes, 8 minor routes and 3 regional routes.

The system operates 7 days a week and typically carries 10,000 people a day. They did not tell us what percentage of the population uses the transit but of the ones who do, 90% use it regularly. Two thirds of the riders are between the ages of 11 and 34 with the busiest route being the University route on weekdays.

The vast majority of riders get to/ from the bus by walking which makes transit an extension of walking trips. The RDN therefore reached the conclusion that creating walkable destinations is critical to grow transit use.

Growing the transit use supports 4 of the Regional Growth Strategy Goals.

- Prepare for Climate Change
- Reduce Energy Consumption
- Coordinate Land Use and Mobility
- Provide Services Efficiently

A portion of the population is *transit dependent* and will use transit services even if it of poor quality. As public transit service quality improves it will

attract an increasing portion of discretionary travelers (people who can travel by automobile but are not opposed to transit use). To attract those discretionary travelers, the Transit department plans to offer quality service (convenient, fast & comfortable), low fares, support (walkable communities, park & ride facilities, commute trip reduction programs), convenient information, incentives, integrated service with special events and a positive image.

The Transit staff undertook some public consultation and received strong public support for the Transit Future Plan Network and Service Design Standards. They also received good feedback on specific actions which they could implement to meet their goal.

The Vision Statement is: *The Regional District of Nanaimo Transit System* supports the region's high quality of urban and rural life by connecting the region's rural village centres, neighbourhoods, and urban areas with high quality transit services that will encourage more people to choose transit as their preferred choice of travel. Integration with other modes of transportation affords people of all abilities a basic level of mobility throughout the

region. Transit service is tailored to the needs of the region's population to be safe, convenient, cost-effective and environmentally responsible."

In the future, they hope to see an integrated system which connects with communities up and down the island.

The presentation was focused on the bus transit system only. Daniel and Jamie referred us to the City of Nanaimo Transportation committee if we want to see the plans for integrating the different modes of transportation such as use of the island rail corridor, etc.

Dave Connolly thanked our speakers and gave them each a handmade wooden pen crafted by "one of our members," which brought a chuckle from the club as Dave is the creator of the Rotary pens.

WE'VE COME A LONG WAY WITH OUR BOOK SALE!

A week from today we embark on our 12th Rotary Used Book Sale since our first sale in the fall of 2007 at Nanaimo North Town Centre. That year we held a 4-day sale over the weekend of October 5th and netted just over \$27,000! We had partnered with Nanaimo Daily News' Raise-a-Reader program to give half the proceeds of our sale to Literacy Nanaimo, which was matched by the province with various percentages over the years.

Flushed with the success of our first sale, the second fall sale was quickly planned and the next year—again a 4-day sale over a weekend in October we managed to achieve sales of \$34,576.

It was after the success of our third sale in 2009 that the mall asked us if we would consider holding a sale in the spring as well as the fall, and we began what is now recognized as a tradition of holding two sales in our Rotary year, each one for 10 days including two weekends.

The Nanaimo North Town Centre continued to support our cause with free space, not only during the sale, but throughout the year where we store our books between sales and where we sort books all year long.

In 2010 retired businessman Rudi Steinmetz took an interest in our efforts at the mall and began helping with advice on how to do what we were doing more efficiently. We soon dubbed our non-Rotarian friend as the "CEO" of our book sale. He later became a Paul Harris Fellow and an Honorary Rotarian.

Rudi began to keep track of the number of books donated to the cause, which ones were the best sellers, and how much money we made from each of the various categories of books.

Since our beginning in 2007 we have held 11 Rotary Used Book Sales and our total net revenue has been \$431,060. Our average inventory of books has been about 75,000 for each sale, of which we sell about 40%. Fiction books are our biggest sellers, although gardening books sell well in our spring sales and cookbooks are good sellers in the fall.

We have about 30 different categories and patrons to the sale come early and stay late each day perusing the thousands of books we offer for sale.

What have we done with the money raised at our book sales?

Literacy Nanaimo leads the list of the recipients of book sale proceeds with \$75,013, matched through the *Raise-a-Reader* program while it lasted, and now we donate 50% of our first weekend proceeds to Literacy Vancouver Island.

Various school projects throughout our local school division are our second largest benefactor with \$74,577. That number includes some funds we received from Bingo funds before that program ended. Third is the Nanaimo Hospital Foundation at \$57,253, including the largest single donation of \$50,000 to the ER department.

International projects come in at \$53,403, with money going to Ghana and other places, followed by the Child Development Centre at \$25,800, Nanaimo Hospice House with \$25,000, and Nanaimo Museum, Rotary Bowl and Minor Baseball with \$10,000 each.

Other various projects that have benefited from our sales have been: Janese Place, Haven House, Nanaimo Military Museum, Nanaimo Music Festival, Friends of the Library, and others totalling \$76,242.

Grand total of funds donated from the hard work of the many volunteers at our Rotary Used Book Sale: (*drumroll please*)—\$417,288!
