



## Speaker Recap - Friday August 11, 2017

Bob Janes introduced the speaker, Rob Hallam, the Executive Director of Nanaimo Habitat for Humanity. Rob has twenty-five years' experience in the non-profit sector.

Habitat for Humanity's vision is that everyone should have a safe and decent place to live. Their approach is to offer families a hand up, and not a hand out.

They serve a relatively narrow niche of qualified families, expecting that in time, after receiving their hand up, families will become conventional home owners. The Habitat model favours multi-generational families because of the favourable impact on kids. For example, children from Habitat homes drop out from school less and graduate more from university.

In essence the Habitat model has three elements: 1) no down payment, 2) interest free mortgage and 3) an applicant must contribute at least 500 hours of sweat equity. Habitat holds the mortgage on the house and retains the right of first refusal if the family decides to sell and move on. Funds from mortgage payments are invested in building more homes.

Habitat for Humanity was founded in 1976 in Georgia USA and the first home was built by the organization in 1984. The first home in Canada was built in 1985. The Central Vancouver Island Habitat was established in 1994 and they opened the Nanaimo Restore in 2001. So far they have completed eighteen homes with two more to be completed this fall.

The current building location is in Extension and is called Meadow Hill. It consists of six single family houses, being built in three phases of two houses each. The third phase is now being built and will include for the first time a two bedroom house adapted for a handicapped owner.

Habitat received 42 applications for the two phase three houses. Of these, 21 applications met the criteria and four were shortlisted for the final selection process. Selection criteria included:



- □ Need: structural safety of present home, space requirements, cost of present housing, if temporary, safety of neighbourhood.
- ☐ Ability to pay: job stability, debt to income ratio, at least three years clear after bankruptcy.
- ☐ Willingness to partner: participate in community events, participate in the strata committee and contribute sweat equity.

Habitat sets mortgage payments at 30% or less of family income. In responding to a question from the floor, Rob said that the houses in Meadow Hill cost about \$300-310,00 and are currently valued at about \$370-380,000. Costs are high because of land acquisition costs. In future, they will build town houses or condos instead of single family detached homes in order to reduce costs.

Rob said that Rotarians can help by shopping in the ReStore store, by donating money and by volunteering. Internationally in 2016, Canadian Habitat for Humanity volunteers helped

1404 families in Ethiopia, Cambodia, El Salvador, Honduras and Haiti.

The ReStore covers all of the administration costs of Habitat. Consequently 100% of any gift to Nanaimo Habitat will be used for the designated purpose. 80% of gifts to the Canadian Habitat federation is used for building homes.

Wendy Pratt thanked Rob for his talk and said she had learned a lot about Habitat's amazing contribution to the community. She particularly appreciated how they respect families while giving them a helping hand.
