

# Rotary International Conference

**Dave Hammond** introduced our guest speaker and fellow Rotarian, **Joan Ryan**, who travelled "down under" for



the Rotary International Convention this past June.

In the midst of the convention was **Vivid Sydney**, an 18 day festival of light, music and ideas. Over 1,430,000 million people attended,

including the 19,000 Rotarian delegates. Joan had some fantastic pictures of the **Opera House** "sails" that were vividly lit up with patterns and colours that changed every few seconds for a kaleidoscope of impressive sights.

The primary purpose of the RI annual convention is to inspire and inform all Rotarians at an international level, particularly incoming club presidents, governors-elect, and other incoming club and RI officers, so they will be motivated to further develop Rotary at club and district levels.

Rotary International 2014 Convention was held in Sydney June to 1-4, at **Sydney Olympic Park**. The Olympic cauldron outside the **Stadium Australia** was lit for the occasion and was an impressive sight. At registration, all attendees received a commemorative book with projects undertaken by all the Australian clubs. One of the projects was an organization that sewed the 20,000 bags handed out at the convention.

All plenary sessions were held in **All-Phones Arena**, which is one of Sydney's most prestigious venues. With stadium seating, it proved to be an excellent venue with a great view from



every seat in the house. The speakers included **Prime Minister Tony** Abbott, Premier of New **South Wales** Mike Baird. **Brett Lee** the Aussie cricket star and founder of Mewsic. Opening night entertainment was musical

group *Human Nature*, four good looking young singers who performed their 1-hour Las Vegas show and had the crowd hopping.

Plenary session 2 saw topics such as the Rotary / UN Resolution on Diabetes, Changing the World One Relationship at a Time, the cricket star's foundation Mewsic; a powerful tool to HEAL, EDUCATE, EMPOWER and ADVO-CATE for underprivileged children in India (Joan's favourite speaker). Other breakout sessions included topics on shortening the gap between Rotary and Rotaract, putting FUN back in Rotary and increasing membership. The traditional House of Friendship was renamed The Billabong - an aboriginal name for a waterhole around which meetings would often be held. 14,000 square meters was dedicated to the display of Rotary work from all over the world, showcasing club projects, Rotary fellowships (informal groups with likeminded interests), wellness pods, Rotary action groups and shopping at the marketplace for souvenirs, local jewelry



During the convention, transportation was free anywhere in the city if you wore your RI badge. Buses, trains, ferries – **Joan** and her granddaughter **Autumn** enjoyed using the Rivercat to ride from her cousin's in the suburb **Parramatta** to the Sydney harbor.

After it was all over, as a Rotarian, Joan felt so proud to see what we were accomplishing worldwide through Rotarian efforts. Joan encouraged all Rotarians to attend at least one RI Convention for a truly memorable experience. Upcoming locations; San Paulo, Brazil in 2015, South Korea 2016, Atlanta, Georgia 2017 and Toronto 2018.

Past President Douglas Anderson thanked Joan for her articulate and detailed presentation – her enthusiasm was great and noted from personal experience, there was nothing as invigorating and empowering for as a Rotarian as going to an RI Convention.

Joan also presented a banner from the Grandville Rotary club.

# Polio took a hit at this year's Rotary convention in Sydney, Australia

First there was the record-breaking climb across the <u>Sydney Harbour</u> <u>Bridge</u> that raised enough money to protect 240,000 kids from polio. On 30 May, two days before the official opening of the convention, 340 participants ascended the bridge, eclipsing the record previously held by Oprah Winfrey for most climbers on the bridge. Waving 278 flags, they also broke the Guinness World Record for most flags flown on a bridge.

Then it was announced that the <u>World's Biggest Commercial</u>, Rotary's public awareness campaign for polio eradication, set a <u>Guinness World Record</u> for largest photo awareness campaign. More than 100,000 people from 170 countries have uploaded their photos, including Archbishop Desmond Tutu, Bill Gates, Archie Panjabi, Jackie Chan, and many more.

But the biggest news was the \$101 million pledged to polio eradication. Australian Prime Minister Tony Abbott opened the convention on 1 June with a commitment from his government of \$100 million to the PolioPlus campaign. Two days later, Sir Emeka Offor, executive vice chair of Chrome Group, announced a \$1 million gift to The Rotary Foundation to help end polio.

"Scores of my friends and classmates fell victim to this dreaded disease," said Sir Emeka, who serves as Rotary's PolioPlus ambassador in Nigeria. "As a young man I vowed that I would someday do something significant to end polio in Nigeria."

While Rotary's work to end polio took center stage at the convention, it wasn't the only Rotary initiative getting attention down under. Here are some highlights from the Sydney convention, which ran 1-4 June:

**Providing clean water**. Collaboration and partnerships were emphasized at this year's <u>World Water Summit</u>, held 30 May. Global experts in clean water and sanitation urged attendees to join with the private sector, nongovernmental organizations, and governments to work more efficiently and effectively.

**Empowering youth**. Australian cricket star Brett Lee, founder of <u>Mewsic</u>, and Maya Ajmera, founder of the <u>Global Fund for Children</u> and former Rotary Scholar, inspired attendees with their dedication to providing a better life for the world's poorest children

**Promoting peace**. Mwila Chigaga, former Rotary Peace Fellow and gender specialist for African Regions at the International Labour Organization, spoke to convention goers about ensuring decent work and equal opportunities for men and women.

Fighting disease. Renee Saunders, senior public health adviser for the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, stressed the importance of public-private partnerships in helping to achieve an AIDS -free generation. Professor Martin Silink spoke of the challenges he overcame — with Rotary's help — to make diabetes a United Nations resolution.
