

# **Tillicum Village: Tammie Wylie**

**Ross White** introduced today's speaker who was Tammie Wylie.

Tammie is a consultant to the Tillicum management team. She has a Masters degree

from Royal Rhodes University and has been associated with Tillicum for most of her adult life. She is of mixed Coast Salish and Danish heritage and has 25 years relevant experience.

Aboriginals in BC continue to need community help and support. About 72% of BC aboriginals live off reserve and about 52% of children in care are aboriginal. The Tillicum Lelum Aboriginal Friendship Centre (TLAFC) began in 1965 as a place to help aboriginal people moving off reserve and therefore no longer able to access services from their band. Today TLAFC occupies a 5





acre site on 10th St and has completed a youth and elders housing unit and a safe house for youth.

Services extend to Ladysmith and Qualicum. They offer over 50 programmes aimed at children, youth, families, single adults, mothers and elders. Programmes include health and wellness, fitness, sports, nutrition, education and literacy, preparation for joining the workforce and traditional culture.

The TLAFC has realised that it must raise its profile and it needs to be integrated into the wider community. This they hope will help overcome the inherited inferiority conditioning among aboriginal people. They are opening up the Centre to the community at large and welcome public agencies to come in and set up within the Centre where native people feel comfortable. For example, VIU dentistry has expressed interest in locating there.

The next expansion at the TLAFC will be the construction of a 25 person capacity Child Care Centre. Although the capital funds have not been secured, they will begin shortly by preparing a group of four year olds for school. Research is now clear that starting early in school leads to better life outcomes.

Most of TLFAC funding is by grants which are obtained by preparing proposals in response to calls for proposals issued by government agencies. Such unpredictable funding is not a base for long term planning. TLFAC holds various events through the year, but these

## **Nigerian Businessman Donates \$1 million**

Nigerian business leader and philanthropist Sir Emeka Offor announced a \$1 million gift to The Rotary Foundation for polio eradication efforts at the Rotary Convention in Sydney.

Sir Emeka, who is executive vice chair of the Chrome Group, has made contributions to Rotary's campaign to rid the world of this deadly disease totaling more than \$3.1 million, including a \$1 million gift he announced at the 2013 convention. He told the attendees at the third plenary session on Tuesday that his commitment to ending polio is personal.

"Scores of my friends and classmates fell victim to this dreaded disease," said Sir Emeka, a member of the Rotary Club of Awka GRA who serves as Rotary's Polio-Plus ambassador in Nigeria. "As a young man I vowed that I would someday do something significant to end polio in Nigeria."

Sir Emeka told the crowd he recently opened a PolioPlus Ambassador's Office, at no cost to Rotary, in Abuja. The office serves as a hub for his ambassadorial activities and supports the work of the Nigeria PolioPlus Committee.

Nigeria, Afghanistan, and Pakistan are the only countries where polio has never been stopped.

Despite tremendous progress — only two documented cases of polio reported in the last 12 months — Offor says the country still faces unprecedented insecurity and inaccessibility in a number of northern states.

"The Nigerian government, now supported by the international community, is doing all that it can to eliminate the widespread violence, abductions, and terrorism," he says. "Peace would facilitate polio eradication, but we cannot sit by and wait until that time comes. We must do what we can to find ways to end polio now."
