Nepal Earthquake Project

Club member Moe Lessan introduced our speaker today; a member of the Davbreak Rotary Club. San Mahara. Moe mentioned that it takes courage and compassion to support humanitarian causes in today's world, and that San is an example for us all.

San Mahara is a native Nepalese, who relocated to Canada 18 years ago. He is a dentist with a practice in town and also an active member of the Daybreak Rotary Club. In April and May of 2015, Dr. Mahara was visiting Ne-

pal in order to identify a good project that the Daybreak Club could support when a 7.9 magnitude earthquake struck. In a matter of hours, massive damage and loss of life had taken place, and the entire country was in a state of destruction and turmoil.

Dr. Mahara was thrown into a state of near-refugeeism as the population fled their houses in fear of the aftershocks, which continued for several weeks. He slept in tents with his Nepalese relatives while attempting to help one another. San's son was on a flight to join his father when the earthquake struck, and the plane still landed, but it took days before they were reunited. San related the riveting experience of human connection that took place in the days and weeks following the earthquake, where distant relatives, acquaint-

ances, and strangers all came together to help, and offered all they owned to help others. The military was called

out to



help, and the countryside soon seemed like a refugee camp with the military presence and organized aid camps.

Using his experience, Rotary connections and funds from the Daybreak Club, San volunteered with the medical group, and used his entire extended family as volunteer labour to purchase, transport and administer the supplies. For several of the transports, they used a wheeled bedframe since nothing else was available. Over 100 people were supported by his support group.

Following his return to Nanaimo, Dr. Mahara has continued his fundraising efforts through a combination of T-shirt sales, candlelight vigils, and donations. In a single fundraising effort, he raised over \$5,600, and intends to continue his efforts. He is very concerned that the ones who will suffer the most are the poor. While the disaster will soon be forgotten by the world at large, the poorest of the victims will continue to be affected. Dr. Mahara is determined to do whatever is possible in his power for their support. An event planned will be a charity hike up Mt. Benson on Saturday, September 26.

Dr. Mahara noted that there is a vast discrepancy in support between nations. For example, during the Japanese tsunami, the international aid equated to \$150,000/hour, while for Nepal, the aid was \$5,000/hr. It's predicted that the repairs to Nepal will cost approximately 50% of the country's GDP: Japan's repairs were approximately 6% of the country's GDP. He mentioned the irony that the best-prepared and most modern countries are also the ones who are bestsupported by their neighbours during a disaster.

For his work, San Mahara was identified as the Daybreak Rotary Club's Rotarian of the Year.
