


**President Lila** opened the meeting with the members singing our national anthem. **Janeane Coutu** gave a thoughtful multi-faith invocation.

# Nanaimo-Ladysmith Schools Foundation

Janeane Coutu introduced Crystal Dennison as the Executive Director of the Nanaimo-Ladysmith Schools Foundation. Crystal has taken on this position after years of experience working with child poverty and women's leadership organizations, including a previous position as Executive Director of Nanaimo's Food Share

program.

Ms. Dennison said the mission of the Foundation is to partner with the community by providing financial support to students, both those in K-12, and those continuing on for post-secondary education. This is done through bursaries and scholarships, as well as funding foodshare,

Stock the Locker, and lunch programs. Access to funding can make an enormous difference to students who never considered education beyond secondary school. The financial support available for further education covers all variety of higher education programs.

A major focus of the foundation is to support district students within the K-12 system by ensuring basic needs such as food, dental and clothing are covered. One in four students is inadequately prepared for school on average throughout the district. Between individual schools, this ranges from around 10% to 45%. Students who are lacking in the basic needs have an extremely hard time keeping up at school, as their focus is not on learning. This can greatly reduce the students' success both in school and throughout their lifetime. Ensuring that the students are properly clothed and fed during school hours helps to keep the focus on learning.

For funding, the Foundation teams with local busi-

nesses, credit unions, and banks. They are currently viewed by the government as a subsidized organization, and are not eligible to receive gaming funds. Hopefully this ruling will soon change as the Foundation is <u>not</u> financially supported by the government. The Foundation to date has provided over \$475,000 in funding for higher education in



the way of grants, scholarships and bursaries. They have a goal of \$50,000 this year.

There were a number of questions and comments from club members, as follows:

- Q: Does the Foundation work with the Canada Child Poverty Conference Board?
- A: Yes, they do partner.
- Q: Does the Foundation support both the school district and independent study?
- A: Only students from the school district are supported at this time.
- Q: What happens to unclaimed scholarships and bursaries, and is there a time limit:
- A: Awardees have up to two full years to begin using the funds, after which time they revert to the Foundation.
- Comment: **John Heisterman** mentioned that he was awarded a \$100 award while at UVIC, and he remembers it every year when a donation requests are made.
- Q: If Rotary chooses to support the Foundation, can the funds be made available for a specific program or area?



Rotarian Bob Fenty thanked Crystal for her presentation and presented her with a cheque for \$1,000 for the Foundation's Stock the Lockers Project as a gift from our club.

• A: Yes, definitely.

**Bob Fenty** thanked Crystal for her presentation, and the wonderful work her organization is doing. Bob has personally seen first-hand many examples of students helped by the Foundation. It was a great pleasure for our club to hear from Crystal. Bob then presented a pen handmade by **Dave Connolly**, as well as a check for \$1,000 for the Stock the Lockers program.
