
the International Service Club for a \$1,000 donation to Project Amigo in Mexico.

Annual General Meeting

The AGM was held, presided over by club Secretary, **Bob Janes**. Minutes from last year's AGM were read. A 2018 budget summary was given by Lynne Pankratz. Lynne made a motion to accept the budget, Frank

Bob Janes made a motion to accept the AGM, **Janeane** Coutu seconded, and it was accepted by the club. Following this, the Charitable Society AGM was held. Lynne Pankratz presented the budget then moved it be accepted. Brent Stetar seconded, and the club approved the budget. Officers for the Charitable Society are the same as for the club. Bob Janes made a motion to adjourn, John Salem seconded, and the club approved.

Speaker Notes for December 8, 2017By Joyce Smith

Charles Ramos introduced our speaker-Dr. Mike Flesher, medical director for Mobile Medical Unit for the Provincial Health Services Authority spoke on coordination of Medical Response for International Disasters. Dr. Flesher has for the past 17 years been an emergency physician in Nanaimo. He has been with Vancouver Island Urban Search and Rescue for 15 years. Mike has personally been involved with three disasters-two hurricanes-one in the Philippines and one in Micronesia and also an Ebola outbreak in West Africa.

The medical response team is expected to coordinate a team of 3 to 20 people within 24 hours of a disaster. The UN Ocha Clusters are responsible for the following areas- food, shelter, water and sanitation, health, displaced personal, nutrition, education, protection and recovery. The UNDA has a very structured team headed by the OSOCC Manager and everyone has their assigned position. OSOCC also has a Virtual site which shows alerts, disasters, simulator, training, meetings, discussions and data, maps and satellite imagery. This allowed the response team to be aware of the conditions at the disaster site, the status of the response, and what assistance is required. Statistics are shown on the website for Ocha to give an overview of the people affected and the region most affected, if it is an epidemic where in the region it is located etc.

What has to be coordinated? The team has to meet the assessed needs, avoid duplication of effort, make efficient use of resources and supply a system and monitor results. The team will often use local people to assist them. Mike gave two examples of two local people who helped the team. After the hurricane in the Philippines, there was no internet, telephone etc., he used a local resident who helped set up a stable internet connection. In another situation another resident helped them connect with the key politicians in the region so that they could expedite their assistance. Dr. Mike Flesher gave some examples also of the respect that the team received from the population while they were providing assistance. Mike said he felt he was completely safe on the streets.

Mike said it was important to remember when he was on the team that the local authorities are in charge and the World Health Organization was there to assist. The emergency team is also required to report status of the disaster for example in Haiti Cholera broke out and had to be reported. Once the immediate issues have been resolved transitional issues such as who is going to pay for medical care after the team leaves and other transitional issues must be addressed.



Near the end of his speech Dr. Mike Flesher came closer to home and talked about what we all should do to prepare for a disaster. At minimum a survival kit that includes: shelter-tarp and rope, tent and old clothes; food-canned food, can opener, fire starter and a stove; water-bottled and purified for at least 7 days minimum preferably for 14 days; small currency and any medical prescriptions required by the residence of the home.

Questions: Bruce Samson asked if they had ever worked with the Armed forces. Mike gave an example of a catastrophe where the armed forces helped transport necessary supplies and set up transportation and facilities. Dr Mike Flesher said there are 80 doctors around the world who are available and trained to respond to an international disaster. Mike also mentioned that as a volunteer you need to make sure you have on your person supplies such as food, clothing and shelter so you would be self sustaining for at least 72 hours, this would include a sat phone and sat connection for data.

Janeane Coutu asked whether security was a concern. Mike responded and said that they were identified by the vests that they wore and that he personally never felt unsafe. In the Ebola disaster he was trained to protect himself in handling the disease including how to put on and take off his protective clothing. In the Philippines if residents saw him in a line up they would push him to the front to make sure he got what he needed right away.

Charles Ramos asked how many calls he would respond to in a year. Mike responded he would have between zero and three calls per year and in one occasion while he was sleeping, a call came in and by the time he was awake, the team had already been filled and was in the air to the disaster.

Frank Shoemaker thanked the speaker for making us more aware of an aspect of disaster support that most of us are not really aware of.
