


VP Brent announced some special anniversaries this week – Egon Holzwarth celebrates 23 years in our club and Dave Hammond 29 years.

Prostate Cancer Awareness

El was born and raised in the Lower

Mainland and spent 30 years living in Saskatchewan before moving to Nanaimo. He has been in the gardening business and locally owned and operated the Weed Man franchise for many years. El has two sons who are also in-

volved in the gardening business and he still continues today looking after many long-time clients with their pruning needs.

But El is not here to talk to us about gardening, he is here to talk about the important subject of prostate awareness and to let us know his is a prostate cancer survivor and was one of the lucky ones who decided to have a complete physical including checks for prostate cancer and found that he had early stages of prostate cancer. And lucky for El that he did listen to his girlfriend who convinced him to have his checkup.

The prostate is a gland found in males that is about the size of a walnut and it is the first gland that tends to get cancer. Early detection of an enlarged prostate is potentially a sign for pros-

tate cancer and men should annually have this checked. When El was 60, his blood test indicated early signs of cancer which was six years ago. He had stage 1 cancer and he has kept his prostate cancer at this stage since detection by taking the organic herb Saw Palmetto on a regular basis and has avoided more intrusive forms of treatment. He plans on taking this herb for the rest of his life.

El spends a lot of his time giving talks on the importance of having regular checks for prostate cancer and early diagnosis. If statistics are correct, he will save the life of one of our male members if they all hear his advice and go for annual checks. He also suggested that having sex regularly reduces the likelihood of getting prostate cancer. Now that's my kind of doctor!

Some of our club members have already been affected by prostate cancer

and all the men in our club should listen to El and take this problem seriously, if not for ourselves, for our family and friends.

El was thanked by **John Salem** who has known him for many years and El continues to do the gardening help at the Salem house so John can spend more time at the golf club.



Next Year's RI Theme, "Be a Gift to the World"

Using their talents, expertise, and leadership, Rotary members worldwide are asked to be gifts to the world this upcoming 2015-16 Rotary year, said Rotary International President-elect K.R. "Ravi" Ravindran recently.

"All of you have been given so many gifts. And you have now been given this great gift: one year to take all your talents, all your gifts, everything that you are and can become -- and Be a Gift to the World," said Ravindran, revealing his presidential theme at the annual five-day training meeting in San Diego, California.



"You have one year to take that potential and turn it into reality. One year to lead the clubs in your district and transform the lives of others. The time is so short, yet there is so much to be done."

Highlighting Rotary's biggest challenge, the eradication of polio, Ravindran said, "A future without polio is a gift that we have promised to the children of the world. And indeed it is a gift that we will give."

Ravindran, a member of the Rotary Club of Colombo, Sri Lanka, used Rotary's successes in the fight to eradicate the disease as an illustration of the impact Rotary members can have in the world. When Rotary set a goal of eradicating polio 25 years ago, it was endemic in 125 countries, and more than 1,000 children were becoming paralyzed each day. Today, polio remains endemic in just three countries, Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan. And in all of 2014, only 333 cases were reported. "We will battle on. We will prevail," he said.

Ravindran discussed some of Rotary's other challenges, including membership. "We have to find a way to bring back the fundamentals that built our organization: the emphasis on high ethical standards in all aspects of our lives, and the classification system that encourages a diversity of expertise in each club," he said. "Too often these ideas are viewed as little more than inconvenient obstacles to increasing our membership. But they have been essential to Rotary's success, and we ignore them at our own peril."

The president-elect closed his speech emphasizing that now is the time to make real change. "You have one year to build monuments that will endure forever, not carved in granite or marble, but in the lives and hearts of generations. This is our time. It will not come again. Let us grasp it," he said.



THE HISTORY OF ROTARY'S MOTTOES

Rotary's official mottoes, Service Above Self and One Profits Most Who Serves Best, trace back to the early days of the organization.

In 1911. He Profits Most Who Serves Best was approved as the Rotary motto at the second convention of the National Association of Rotary Clubs of America, in Portland, Oregon. It was adapted from a speech made by Rotarian Arthur Frederick Sheldon to the first convention, held in

Chicago the previous year. Sheldon declared that "only the science of right conduct toward others pays. Business is the science of human services. He profits most who serves his fellows best."

The Portland convention also inspired the motto Service Above Self. During a convention outing on the Columbia River, Ben Collins, president of the Rotary Club of Minneapolis, Minnesota, USA, talked with Seattle Rotarian J.E. Pinkham about the proper way to organize a Rotary club, offering the principle his club had adopted: Service, Not Self. Pinkham invited Paul P. Harris, who also was on the boat trip, to join their conversation. Harris asked Collins to address the convention, and the phrase Service, Not Self was met with great enthusiasm.

At the 1950 RI Convention in Detroit, slightly modified versions of the two slogans were formally approved as the official mot-toes of Rotary: He Profits Most Who Serves Best and Service Above Self. The 1989 Council on Legislation established Service Above Self as the principal motto of Rotary, because it best conveys the philosophy of unselfish volunteer service. He Profits Most Who Serves Best was modified by the 2004 Council to They Profit Most Who Serve Best and by the 2010 Council to its current wording, One Profits Most Who Serves Best.
