

Speaker Recap – Friday January 5, 2017 Submitted by Brent Barootes

This week we were entertained and educated by one of our own and his partner. Our speakers were introduced by **Mike Herold** who truthfully noted they don't really need an introduction to our Club members but did note he had previously introduced **Charles** as a speaker... something about a presentation on nude sailing from Hawaii! Anyway... **Charles Ramos** and **Sari Saunders** took the podium. Truly this was a presentation by Sari who was great. Charles was the "color commentator" or as he noted... added comic relief.

Sari started out on their holiday presentation on the Galapagos Islands holiday by asking who had ever visited the Galapagos Islands and about 4 hands went up. Spoiler alert... at the end Sari asked now who would like to visit the Galapagos Islands and about 35 hands went up. That tells you how great the presentation was!

Sari, Charles and their two children Abigail and Alex spent about 11 days on the Galapagos Islands while on a tour of Peru as well. As **Mike Herold** noted in his introduction, Sari and Charles have been exploring the world together on excursion since 1996 and this trip was also a celebration of the 18 years of marriage.

The family flew from Equador to the main airstrip in the Galapagos Islands on the island of Baltra and then foot ferried and bus rides over to Puerto Ayora. The entire Galapagos Islands has a population of 25,000 people and the largest centre () is 12,000 of that! The one-and-a-half-hour flight from Equador to cover the 1000 km trip brought them to a land of volcanos, vegetation, culture and exploration. Galapagos Islands consist of about 12 main islands of a total

of 60 islands and islets. It is right on the equator and is also a designated UNESCO World Heritage site. Interestingly enough, Charles noted that the Equadorian government has actually now instituted policy that the only people that can actual live and habitat on the Galapagos Islands are those that are presently there or who are grandfathered to live there based on ancestral roots. These islands (because of so many active volcanoes and history of the area), range in age from over 90 million years to as young as about 1 million years! The islands were home to many different types of "settlers" including pirates, shipwrecks, penal colonies and more. All this lead to a terrific cross section of cultural diversity in exploring about the islands. Their guided tour for the 11 days included both marine and land experiences.

These islands, as Sari noted, were part of the visit and voyage lead by Charles Darwin for his Voyage of the Beagle... but more importantly... this was the starting point for Darwin's thinking and in-depth understanding about nature, humans and the ultimate outcome was his Origin of the Species. And it all started here on the Galapagos Islands. These islands played a critical role in the development of the theories of evolution!

In his color commentary role Charles noted that 90% of the food consumed on the island is locally produced and seafood is a major part of that production. As he said... you had better like seafood if you visit the Galapagos Islands! He also noted the currency of record was basically the US dollar and costs were about 30% cheaper than in Canada.

Upon arrival on Puerto Ayora they were fascinated by the cornucopia of natural delight. Everywhere they looked was

nature. In addition to the animals that were everywhere possessed no fear of humans... just walked through the market at their leisure and on the streets and yards. There were sea lions, pelicans, marine iguanas, giant tortoises, giant turtles and so much more including amazing bird watching (especially finches) and also terrific floral and fauna. It was a paradise! On this island the visit



to the Charles Darwin Research Centre was amazing as they learned about and witnessed the breeding centre for endemic species including tortoises and mangrove finch. Sari noted how the finch could be found on different island of which is endemic to that specific island... absolutely fascinating!

Charles... who was fascinated by the iguanas noted that how iguanas anywhere else are not marine animals and live in trees. The ones on the Galapagos Islands though, like most of nature (animals and plants) had to adapt. These iguanas deep dive in the ocean and then have learned to "sneeze" out the salt through their nostrils.

Sari noted that they went snorkelling a great deal in the Itabaca Canal and elsewhere. From this main island visit (45 minutes coast to coast are the largest distance points) they learned the water was very cold. Each island in addition to the dry, rough volcanic coast lines was home to terrific vegetation in the highlands... typically 800 to 1500 metres above sea level. It was interesting to note that the tortoises would come up from the coast line to the Santa Cruz highlands for vegetation for feeding! This area was also home to the adventure of the volcanic tunnels and tours. Sari also noted beyond the nature side the cultural aspect of the Galapagos Islands was amazing. The markets and shops and food establishments were terrific, and everyone was so very friendly. Charles noted how the locals and tourists mingled as one versus the traditional "us and them" tourist and local scenario in many tourist destinations.



The family visited other islands including the historic Florena and their bizarre history of disappearing European settlers in the 1800 and 1900s. The biggest island of Isabella showcased for them the albatross and the most active volcanoes as well as flamingos. It was obviously and amazing trip and a fantastic presentation to our club.

John Heisterman then had the privilege of thanking Sari and Charles. He also noted how it was his understanding that Sari had continued to encourage Charles to do more swimming with the sharks when they were there... but obviously he did not do enough as such! As John later pointed out... it is presentation like these by our own club members and their travels that are so fascinating. And he is right (I cannot believe I put that in writing!).
