

from across the globe. Tickets are \$25 for students, \$35 for adults and funds raised will be used for local and international projects.


President Bob reported from the *Festival of Trees* that our tree was voted #3 and raised \$1238.

Youth Protection

The programme today was Rotary Youth Protection, presented by **Joan Ryan.**



Jane Currie introduced Joan as today's presenter.
Joan has been a Rotarian since 2003 and has been very active in that time, including a year as club president, dur-

ing which she became famous for her handmade 'Newfie' bookmarks, which were distributed weekly during her term. Joan is involved in a number of humanitarian causes, and works with the full spectrum of ages; from seniors and elders with Lifeline, to youth as the Rotaract and Interact coordinator. Joan is the club's Youth Protection Officer, and is here to discuss this aspect of the Rotary Youth programs.

Program

The Rotary Youth Protection Pro-

gram mandate is to provide a safe environment for youths participating in Rotary and Rotary-sponsored activities, and includes a code of conduct in regards to adult involvement with youths that covers all Rotary programs that work with youth, including the following:

- Rotary Youth Exchange
- Rotary Youth Leadership Awards
- Rotaract
- Interact

The program has been instituted in order to provide guidelines for both youths and Rotarians, to ensure clarification is given for a variety of scenarios. In addition to standard criminal record check certifications, the program also identifies the level of volunteer involvement that would either require or not require the full criminal record check procedure. Rotary International has a number of online documents in regards to Youth Protection, and has a detailed checklist that each club president is required to complete and sign off to verify the club's compliance.

Online criminal record check verification has been set up to simplify the approval process for volunteer Rotarians, and club training sessions such as today's program are now being offered to provide the resources for volunteers.

One action that the Nanaimo North Club has done is to prepare a number of signs identifying drivers and their vehicles as Rotarians when picking up youth for events.

President Bob Wilson thanked



the speaker for her work on this challenging and complex subject, and further mentioned that he is personally very appreciative of Joan's knowledge and work in ensuring the club's compliance when he was required to sign our club's compliance document.

District Governor Michael Proctor's January 2015 message

It is amazing how time flies when you are having fun. I have just completed my first six busy and extremely enjoyable months as your District Governor.

The hottest topic at virtually every club has been **membership**. Many clubs say that they are having trouble meeting their membership growth objectives. Why is this? Usually it is lack of awareness of the diversity of Rotary's contributions both locally and internationally.

My firm belief is that the best way to recruit new members to Rotary clubs is to let them know what Rotary does. Unfortunately the great work that we do, both in our communities and internationally, is far too often a well-kept secret.

Our Rotary International President, Gary Huang, has requested that all Ro-



tary clubs in the world celebrate "ROTARY DAYS" to make everybody in our communities far more aware of what Rotary does in the world. This is especially true as we start a new calendar year, as that is why January has been designated as **Rotary Awareness Month**.

In President Huang's letter in the January issue of Rotarian magazine he says, "How you do this is something I am leaving up to you. It can be a full day or just a few hours; it can be a service project, a festival, or any kind of event you want. As

long as it's open to the community, embraces the whole family of Rotary, and is fun, it's a ROTARY DAY."

I have heard of many exciting ROTARY DAY projects in our district during the past six months, and I encourage all of the 88 Rotary clubs in our district to continue with this theme in as many ways as possible for the remainder of this Rotary year.

In addition to a Rotary Day event, it is important for clubs to create visibility in their communities. Some club websites do an excellent job of listing all the projects that they support and the dollar amounts dedicated to each project. Some also show the total dollars spent in their community over the past 10 or 12 years which can amount to several hundred thousand dollars, a figure that amazes nonmembers when they see it. Many clubs also have a large poster board board on display at every club function and project.

At a recent club board meeting I attended in Puyallup, I met a young woman who had been a Rotary member for only two years. I asked her why she chose to join Rotary. She said that she had some extra time available and wanted to do some volunteer work. She went on to say that her uncle, a longtime member of Kiwanis, suggested that she consider joining that organization. She decided to look at other groups and when she reviewed Rotary online, she was so impressed with what she saw that she made the decision to join. It proved the point that I have been stressing throughout the district..."Let people know what we do".
