# **God's Hope School in Haiti**

Brent Barootes introduced today's speaker: Greg



**Brady**, who is speaking to us about God's Hope School in Haiti. Greg is originally from Saskatchewan, where he lived for his first 20 years; from there, he moved to the Northwest Territories, where he spent another 20 years working for the government. He's also worked in BC's interior and north for 13 years. Greg

now lives in a float home in Cowichan Bay, and this is where Brent first met him while visiting the bay with his wife and daughter. Brent was impressed with Greg's story about his work in Haiti, and invited him to present to our club.

Greg's history with Haiti began when he was working on a humanitarian mission through a religious group in 2009-2010. He left the country on January 12, 2010, just one hour before the earthquake hit and devastated the country. During the restoration efforts, Greg returned to Haiti and founded an elementary school through his own funds, and those of some Canadian contributors. Through the years, Greg has maintained his support of the school while also fundraising through religious organizations, Rotary and other organizations.

Haiti is the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere, and is greatly lacking in much of the amenities taken for granted by most of the western world. Adequate drinking water, sanitation, and education are available for only a



small proportion of the residents and the rest are left to fend for themselves. The amount of money Greg and his funders have been able to contribute is small, but is so much more than is otherwise available, that it has allowed the school to operate for the last 6 years. At this time, there are 230 elementary age children attending a school housed in a 20'x60' building.

The ongoing funding supports school improvements such as concrete flooring, walls and roof, and helps to pay for teaching services and supplies. The teachers are certified by Haiti's government, and have elementary school teachers' credentials. On each trip, Greg tries to bring as much second hand clothing and supplies as he

can get on the plane.

There were a number of questions and comments by club members follow-



ing the presentation. **Lila Tanner** thanked Greg and said he is an admirable role model with incredible dedication. Greg was presented with a wooden pen handmade by **Al Smith** as a token of the club's appreciation.
