Science & Sustainability Society

On Friday, July 3^{rd,} **Frank Shoemaker,** on behalf of Rotary, welcomed **Morgan Atwell** from the Nanaimo Sci-



ence and Sustainability Society (NSS). Morgan is the coordinator for this organization that started five years ago in Nanaimo. Morgan has a science background, (Bachelor of Science) from Vancouver Island University and decided to join NSS in 2012. NSS is a mission based not for profit which is committed to "Hands on Science Learning". Currently the organization is housed in the Eco School in Departure Bay utilizing one of the classrooms as a home base. One of the goals of this organization is to get children into nature and help them understand what nature is and why we need to protect it.

Some of the science projects that currently are available are: Science on the Move – a mobile science van, Spooktacular Race, PI day, Early Years program, Citizen Science Program and Community Science Day. These are just a few of the ongoing events. Morgan wants her young students to become "Science Rock Stars".



Her students come from all different walks of life and this organization tries to offer frequent free events for families that could otherwise not afford to attend the programs. There events draw large and small crowds. One recent event was the *Trash to Treasures* program which saw children collect items from the



beach and make it into an art treasure. She hopes to run this for grade 6 children next year.

The Science and Sustainability Society is partnered with Vancouver Island University and frequently brings in faculty to teach the children and also utilizes university students and VIU resources to enhance and enrich programs.

Morgan also has a research component to her classes. At present she and some of her students are following the life of the Varnish Clam and are mapping and grafting what is happening with the invasive (non-indigenous) species.

The organization recently won the SE Catalysts Award and has multiple community partners that support this not for profit. NSS welcomes volunteers and donations and the Long term goal of the organization is to have an indooroutdoor science centre for Nanaimo.



Morgan was thanked for her presentation by **Kevin Cantelon**, who presented her with the coveted Rotary pen hand-made by one of our members.

Foundation Giving Nears Record High



Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair **John Kenny** updated attendees at the Rotary Convention in São Paulo, Brazil on the progress of the Foundation. One of his goals as chair was to increase giving. The Annual Fund reached almost \$117 million in 2013-14. This year, if contributions continue at the normal June rate, the fund will top that figure, making it the highest ever, he said.

The Foundation's Endowment Fund has reached a milestone of \$1 billion, where spendable earnings will provide nearly \$13 million of direct financial support next year, more than double the amount five years ago.

"Let us remember that when we give to our Foundation, we are not sending cash to Evanston," Kenny said. "We are helping a blind man to see, a polio victim to walk, a child to grow to adulthood healthily, a student to become educated, and a family to have enough food to eat."

More than 400 district grants and over 600 global grants have been awarded in 2014-15, said Kenny. "The Trustees are conscious of obtaining the views of Rotarians and are seeking their observations on the new program so that they can be considered when a review is made in the 2015-16 Rotary year."

Kenny praised the expansion of the Rotary Peace Centres program. There have been 312 endorsed applications this year from 85 countries, the highest number since the program began in 2002. Of the 100 fellows selected, more than half are from low-income countries.

"We should be encouraged to see that this imaginative program is expanding, for it is surely most pertinent in these troubled times," he said.

"The future health of the Foundation is in all our hands," he concluded. "The real work of Rotary is carried out by individual Rotarians in their clubs, for the club is the heart of Rotary."


