

District Governor's Official Visit

Assistant Governor Barry Sparkes of the Lantzville Rotary Club introduced our guest speaker, newly installed District Governor Michael

Proctor. Mike was born in Vancouver. BC and attended UBC. He was trained in Europe at the British Motor Corporation and then returned to Canada. working for BMC Canada, and then Chrvsler in Vancouver and Red Deer before moving to the Peace River with his

own dealership in 1977. He was very involved in his community in the Peace River serving on town council and then as mayor for 12 years. He became an honorary member of the Rotary Club of Peace River in 1986 when elected as mayor, and then joined as a member

paid a symbolic \$5 for this him to become a Governor once he left that office. Mike moved to Vancouver Island in 2003 and joined the *Rotary Club of Qualicum* where he has served as Secretary, Conference Chair and as Assistant Governor. Mike is a multiple PHF, Major Donor and Level 7 Benefactor.

DG Mike stated he would cover the obligatory topics of The Rotary Foundation (TRF) and membership, as well as the theme for the Rotary year. But to quote Henry the Eighth's statement to his wives "I won't keep you long". And so the stage was set for a frank and humorous talk.

The **Foundation** is an important part of Rotary providing the fund generating arm that allows the great Projects of Rotary to happen around the World. Closer to home, the *District Matching Grant* funds are directly related to the funds donated by members in our District 5020. We reap benefits of our own giving locally. Mike visited **Ghana** and was impressed with the various projects that have been completed in Sunyani that we and other area clubs sponsored.

He stated that contributions to the *Annual Giving Fund* have declined due to the Polio Plus initiative. He mentioned that a most rewarding event is travelling to another country for an immunization day or to visit a project site – what a great opportunity to see up close the good works of Rotary.

Mike shared his *Rotary Moment* – the moment when you realize that you are a Rotarian (and not just a member of a Rotary club). His was in Ghana where he observed a group of children sitting on the steps with the arms around each other and he realized that is probably all they have in the world – each other.

Membership continues to be a hot topic in Rotary. Almost as many members left Rotary last year that joined Rotary – retention is a challenge. Engagement of members seems to be the issue and clubs need to look inside and see if they are doing all they can to make new members feel welcome and involved. His club in Qualicum has developed a questionnaire for new mem

bers that they have them fill out at the 8 month mark and it asks some key questions on engagement. Statistics tell us that only 15% of members ever invite another person to join their Rotary club, "Do the other 85% not have any friends or business associates?" We all do, so why don't we ask people to come as a guest? The worst that can happen is they say no. "Get your ASK in gear!" There are now a variety of membership types, less focus on owners or managers, and far less importance is place on regular meeting attendance – allow members to participate when they can.

DG Mike touch briefly on **Youth Exchange** which he described as a wonderful experience for young people and Rotary Clubs. It is challenging to find host families and the financial burden can be difficult for a club. Participation has dropped over the years in the District but he encouraged us to press on and continue to support the program.

LIGHT UP ROTARY

This year's Rotary theme is "*Light up Rotary*". To quote **RI President Gary Huang**, "it is said, there are so many people that need help, there is nothing I can do. That is not the Rotary way. The Rotary way is to light a candle. I light one candle, you light one candle – and so do 1.2 million other Rotarians. Together we can do so much more that we would ever do alone. Together, we can light up the world."

Each club will know their strengths and community needs. Celebrate your club in your community, host a Rotary day to show what Rotary is and what we do, involve your extended Rotary family. Light up Rotary in Nanaimo.

DRUG WARS, FINANCIAL SETBACKS NO MATCH FOR MEXICO CLINIC

About 300 miles south of Ciudad Juarez, one of Mexico's most dangerous cities, is the small town of Guerrero in central Chihuahua. The community is home to the Guerrero Clinic, which has weathered neighboring drug wars and financial setbacks to treat the poor since 1980.

Walter Branson, a member of the Rotary Club of Brazosport, Texas, in the United States, has been involved with the clinic since 1983. Branson says the governor of Chihuahua credits the clinic with providing 60 percent of indigent care in the state.

The drug wars in Mexico, which began in 2006, initially scared away U.S. volunteers. At one point, volunteers to Guerrero dipped to 20 volunteers from a high of 50. And in 2010, the clinic had to be canceled for six months after the U.S. State Department issued a travel ban to Mexico. Despite the cautious approach, Guerrero is not typically viewed to be as dangerous as some of the border towns in Chihuahua like Ciudad Juarez.

"I tell [volunteers] we're not going to take them to an area where we know there's a problem. We don't take that chance," Branson says.

It's taken not only the support of the community in Guerrero, but the cooperation of Rotary clubs in Southeast Texas and in northern Mexico to grow and sustain the clinic.

The clinic opens its doors and offers free health care services as often as six times a year. Optometry is its primary focus with up to 550 cataract surgeries performed each year, but it also offers cleft palate surgeries, skin grafts, cancer screenings, and pap smears. As many as 1,000 patients come through the clinic each week it operates.

Branson says people have been known to travel over 1,200 miles to be treated at the clinic, many because the services are free. He recalls one couple bringing their baby in to repair a cleft palate. "They traveled from Acapulco to Guerrero because they had no money to pay for the surgery," he says.

FUNDING GAPS

As the clinic has grown so has the cost to keep it running. To help with funding, several clubs in Mexico formed the nonprofit Rotary Foundation of Guerrero (Fundación Rotaria de Guerrero A.C.) in 2003. The foundation won loans through the federal health care program until loans were suspended in 2012.

Celso Reyes, of the Rotary Club of Torreón, says that the clubs in both countries have had to renew their fundraising tactics to recoup lost funding. Additionally, they have applied for various Rotary grants throughout the years; most recently they secured a matching grant sponsored by several clubs in Mexico. The clinic also relies on non-Rotary organizations such as Alcon Labs, a health and eye care company, for donations of medical supplies.

"It's one thing to hear about the work being done," Reyes says. "But [only] until you visit, until you're actually there and you see the profound change made in the lives of the people who get their vision back or have a cleft palate surgery, do you see how wonderful it is. It is a great experience."
