

Dentistry:Oral Health Tips, Facts, Myths and Neglect

Our speaker was our own member, **Ellen Ross** who is currently a part time instructor at VIU's Dental Assistant Program. Prior to coming to Nanaimo, Ellen was an Oral Health Promoter at the University of Manitoba and Halton Region Health Department in Ontario.

Her dental background includes a diploma in Geriatrics which helped her design dental programs for the elderly. She recently started a dental Not-for-profit in Nanaimo and collects recyclable cans and bottles to fund the program and help individuals that cannot afford the cost of dental treatment.

One of the biggest contributors to oral health problems are nutrition. Healthy eating is not happening

among the poorer population; they are eating preserved foods that are inexpensive but contain sugars and carbohydrates

Early Childhood Dental Cavities are on the rise again with such parental practices as filling baby bottles with Coca Cola when the family cannot afford to buy healthy food/drinks. Dental Plaque leads to irreversible cavities and infection in the gum tissues. It also leads to formation of hard deposits that can cause gingivitis and periodontal disease. The hard deposits can only be removed by dental professionals and if a person cannot afford to go to a dentist their dental health will suffer as well as their general health. Research has been done and indicates oral damage (infections) can be linked to systemic health issues.

Daily oral care is a western regiment of brushing on average twice a day and flossing once a day. Canadian stats from 2007 claim 62% of us have dental insurance. Ellen challenges that number because in the last few years full time jobs with benefits continue to decline. Lost school days equal 2.26million annually, and 4.15m working days are lost due to dental visits and dental sick days. In the USA, 45 million estimated without dental insurance and they have similar problems that are in Canada. In Great Britain there is a national health system that pays for basic dental care. It has been in place since 1948. Many people in Britain have become complacent about their dental health and dental professionals are having little influence on levels of oral health. Officials there use fluoride in the water as a dental protection measure and plan to continue fluoride use to control the number of cavities.

In Africa, 60-80% of the population is rural; most of the dental practitioners are in larger urban centres and little care goes out to the rural areas. Dental care in rural areas is rarely provided until it is an emergency. The same story can be told of India and South America.

In Peru, they rely heavily on volunteer dentistry by Canadians. The county actually has dentists and many training programs, but the graduates often do not do outreach work in their own rural areas. They rely on Canadians who for free are providing treatment, toothbrushes, toothpaste, and fluoride application. The same can be said for India – lots of schools and qualified people but not making the efforts in outreach service.



All over the world prevention (education) programs are being cut or shut down altogether, including Canada.

Locally in Nanaimo we have a high number of children on income assistance, a high number of working poor, homeless people, low income seniors, and a large first nation's population. Much of an individual's / families household income is spent on housing which doesn't leave much for

all the other bills, including food purchases so they tend to buy lower quality preserved foods with high sugar content and often many of these same individuals do not have any type of dental insurance.

The Community Organized Dental Clinic (CODE) is not for profit, low cost Dental Clinic operating in Nanaimo with volunteer practitioners. The problem is that it operates on an occasional basis with no set or consistent hours and days. This makes accessibility difficult for low income people who can't phone or check online to see if it is operating on a given day. They have enjoyed multiple donations from Rotary and other private donors and ideally it would be great to get enough funding to be open on a regular schedule.

In closing, Ellen identified and implosion of trends; workforce is part time (not full time) so dental benefits aren't being provided by employers

No equity in dental health care access (homeless, low income, seniors)

There is an oversupply in dentists in urban areas not enough in rural areas. Dental Associations are trying to help by lobbying government but there is little progress to date.

Bruce Samson thanked Ellen for her excellent presentation and presented her with a Rotary pen.


