





Strong Nations

Terri Mack is an author and owner of the Strong Nations Book Store located on Bowen Road here in Nanaimo. She is a member of the Da'naxda'xw Awaetlala Nation and came from a small community near Alert Bay. Her first nation's name "Kay Kwee Kway Kwa" means she who appears and disappears. She was given her name at a traditional Potlach ceremony.

Terri has worked within Aboriginal Education for 20 years, 17 within the public system of Nanaimo-Ladysmith School District and most recently on reserve with Stz'uminus First Nation as the Community Literacy Coordinator for the past 3 years.

During her career within education, 16 of those years have been dedicated to literacy initiatives around the province of B.C. She has worked in partnership with SFU, VIU, and many school districts. Terri has designed an Intermediate and Primary Rec 'N Reading which is a summer based "Camp" for students reading significantly below grade level.

Prior to opening the book store Terri started her book business as an online company and ran her business out of her basement. She developed and continues to develop books and edu-

cational resources that have strong connections to indigenous life not only here in Nanaimo but also the rest of Canada and other countries. She found there were not a lot of indigenous books available and she and friends set a timeline to develop and publish 40 books. Terri's publishing's are from 1 of only 4 first nations publishing houses.

Terri's passion for books and literacy stemmed from her mother's upbringing. Her mother attended a residential school and her mother tended not to be connected to her first nation's culture. Terri has a desire to change this for other first nation's people especially children.

Within BC there are 43 different first nations groups all with different traditions and lifestyles. The books Terri writes are all interconnected with real life aboriginal scenarios. Terri's store is considered the largest indigenous book store in Canada. Her goal for this summer is to write 30 more books. She has been asked to translate her books in to multiple aboriginal languages here in Canada and other aboriginal languages around the world.

She has also started to develop aboriginal flash cards, colouring books and games that relate to aboriginal culture. Terri has worked with Tsimshian artist Bill Helin to do her books artistry, which gives the stories additional strength and celebration of aboriginal culture.

Terri is committed and passionate to bringing the best

ROTARY ENCOURAGES PAKISTAN TO CONTINUE ITS PROGRESS TOWARD ENDING POLIO

Islamabad — Rotary's international leaders in the global fight to eradicate polio are in Pakistan to recognize the country's continued commitment and progress toward ending the paralyzing but vaccine-preventable disease. Rotary Foundation Trustee Vice-Chair Mike McGovern who also serves as chair of Rotary's International PolioPlus Committee and PolioPlus Director Dr. Carol Pandak are meeting Rotary members and high-level government officials during their visit.

Pakistan – one of only three countries where polio has never been stopped – accounted for nearly 90% of the world's polio cases last year. As a result of continued measures to reach all children with the polio vaccine, and with the support of Rotary's National PolioPlus Committee in Pakistan – spearheaded by chair Aziz Memon – polio cases are down nearly 70% this year compared to the same period in 2014.
