New Member Talks

Christine Parsons has had many interactions with Rotary over her life. As a teenager, she was involved in RYLA. One of the first charities she worked with, which did work in Ethiopia, was supported by Rotary. In fact, CARE Canada was started by Rotarians in Toronto.



Christine moved to Nanaimo about 1 year ago with her 5-year-

old daughter so that she could be close to her parents.

Our community has lots of activities and services to offer but there is still a close community feel to living here. Her daughter attends the French school and they live in the old part of town – all of which come with significant feelings of community attachment. When she was offered her current job with CARE Canada, she asked if she could live in Nanaimo as it was close to Vancouver. She is pleased that they agreed as she can work from home and commute to Vancouver once a week. She loves living in our beautiful city.

As a young university student, Christine decided she wanted to take a year to travel. Her mother was not enamoured with this decision, as she feared for Christine's safety. Her first job was doing housekeeping in England – not her favourite type of work. From there she travelled to Israel and India, which opened her eyes to development work that needed to be done. In the end, all of her overseas travels and volunteer work helped her get into grad school at Oxford University.

Christine has spent the last 20 years working throughout the world - Indonesia, Gaza, West Bank, Lebanon, Nigeria as well as doing development work in Ottawa and working for the UN secretariat in New York. After the tsunami in 2004, she spent two years working in Aceh helping to rebuild. Despite her parents concerns about low salaries and no pension as an aid worker, it is obvious that Christine is passionate about the work that she does. She has been involved in program design and program writing and is currently the fundraising and public awareness representative in Western Canada for CARE Canada.

Christine is passionate about travelling but is grounded in her beliefs around raising her daughter. The type of work she has had can be difficult on relationships and so as a single mom she must find the balance between parenting, work, and travel. She is honoured to be a part of

who has a unique membership with our club. He is part of our first corporate membership! David works at VIU in the MBA program. He sees himself as a connector and so loves his position of working with the students in the program as he fosters the internship program. The VIU MBA program has students from 46 differ-

ent countries and is currently the largest and youngest MBA program west of Waterloo! He proudly announced that VIU entered the national contest with other MBA programs and attained a first place standing for team spirit and a fourth overall. In January 2017, VIU will be hosting universities from across Canada for the national competition in our fine city.

David has lived in Victoria, Winnipeg, Calgary, Australia, Japan and Prince George. After a career in the trades, where he fell off too many roofs, her pursued adult basic education and finds it gratifying to see the students succeed. He sees himself as a lifelong learner and is currently pursuing a Masters Degree in Sustainable Leisure Management. Although he finds it harder to learn as an older adult, he sees the program as fun and a step towards what he might do in retirement. Looking at the cities he has lived and worked in, he said that beer was the common denominator but now he sees the wine industry playing a significant factor in his retirement plans. David has always been attracted to the term "service above self" and sees himself becoming more involved in community events and giving back.

Originally he joined Rotary to make connections but is now realizing how many wonderful people there are in Nanaimo and the great things that our club does for our community. He believes that the world is better because of Rotary.
