Program Notes, June 15, 2018 by Denise Wittkofski

**Peggy Richardson** introduced Vancouver Island Symphony Conductor **Pierre Simard** and his wife **Nadia**, who also performs with the symphony.

Pierre thanked the club for welcoming him here and



asked how many of us had not attended the VI Symphony. To the many raised hands, he cheered, "yay!... which means I am not only talking a converted group but am hoping to convert a few more souls to the symphony's cause."

He continued with a brief history of the symphony here in Nanaimo, which existed in the 1920s, it

disappeared, then re-emerged as a community orchestra, the Symphony Society, which had its ups and downs. It was 24 years ago that a group said we should have a symphonic force in town and be serious about it.

Thus the Society approached Marlin Wolf to lead the

organization. He insisted that the group be professional, and this is when it became the Vancouver Island Symphony. The goal was to offer classical music to not just VI, but to other cities.

With that, Pierre drew our attention to the VI Symphony brochures on our tables and talked of his pride of being conductor for over10 years. When he took over it from Marlin it had just seven programs per year. They stayed with that structure for a few years, and has made a breakthrough in the last few years to expand beyond the seven main programs of a classical nature, with a chamber orchestra series, some afternoon series and other special programs.

He stressed the fact that this orchestra is very closely tied to its community and does a lot of outreach, especially with schools. They send the symphony into



schools, like a "mini Rotary club" for children. Being part of this club makes the children feel special and part of important events.

The symphony also maintains a children's choir that is invited to join the symphony choir as a feature during a performance. And the symphony extends its outreach to a community day in October, offering a "petting zoo of instruments" that allows children to try out an instrument of their choosing.

As for economics, the VI Symphony is a non-profit, separate from the Port Theatre, with its own board of directors. It works in synergy with the Port Theatre, its principle venue. The symphony does extend its outreach throughout the island from Courtney/Campbell River to



Duncan to Victoria.

Funding sources include ticket sales, which account for about ¼ of their revenue. Another ¼ comes from government funding, including Canada Council, the City of Nanaimo and the BC Arts Council. They also get monies from individual foundations, service clubs and corporate sponsorships.

But because of the size of the organization is a fragile organization that has carried a structural deficit for all of its 24 years of existence.

The part-time personnel include 7-8 in Nanaimo, others from elsewhere. The symphony is just a small part of members' revenue as most have other jobs in other professions and in music. Most live in Vancouver and Victoria because there is not enough work here.

The Symphony prides itself in innovation – every concert is a special event and has in the past 5 years commissioned 5 new compositions by 5 new composers, which had a great impact on its funding.

In light of that innovation, Pierre presented a portion of one new work featuring Inventions, which he wrote, created electronic tracks and wife Nadia sang and wrote the script. It also featured both the adult and children choirs. Short films augmented the 7 different pieces. His excerpt was "Printing Press," and most impressive with Nadia's song, the choirs, audiovisuals and electronic tracks.

#### **Q&A** ensued, including:

**Kathy:** What is the average salary of a musician?

**Pierre:** What would you guess?

**Kathy:** For just our own orchestra? \$25-30,000? (to

which **Nadia** burst out laughing)

**Pierre:** Thank you for that because that is the common conception. Someone who attends all shows here in the year will make \$5-6,000 per year. They do it because they have a tremendous sense of belonging to this orchestra. We treat them well beyond the money aspect. We create a respectful work environment; we are very vigorous and strive for excellence.

**Bruce Forward:** How as individuals can we make sure this stays always in Nanaimo outside of just spending money on a ticket?

Pierre: So you brought me to my closing words: Today, I am not here to ask for money, but asking for this group to be aware that this orchestra is playing an incredible role. We have been striving as this city has been trying to strive ... we see a lot of people coming in ... and this orchestra needs to be the cultural reflection of a town. Because we are so flexible. We also deal with dance, we deal with theatre, we deal with visual arts, we include literature, we go to schools, we do community stuff...so we are a cultural hub. So the answer to your question is "Bring your friends." Be ambassadors. Be proud of the fact that this city boasts an excellent orchestra that is on par with Victoria productions, Vancouver productions. It's quite incredible.

**Lila** thanked **Pierre** for his inspirational presentation and offered a pen hand-made by a Rotary member.
