Wanderings: Six months in Europe

Faye Laing and her husband David have fulfilled a life long dream and had a life changing experience by living in Europe for six months. Their dream was to do this trip and to combine it with visits with their son and grandkids. Her son and his wife are both research scientists doing brain research in northern Italy. They live in Roverto, a small city with

45,000 people, a history of manufacturing silk and a village in wine country. Faye and her husband are seasoned travellers preferring a "middle of the road" experience where they can be part of the community and walk to the market, shops and restaurants. Their place in Roverto allowed them to have a nice home, a place to visit family and a place to use as a starting point for many other adventures.

After one week of camping with family, they settled into Roverto. The trails that led from mountain top to mountain top allowed them to meander past castles, through villages and to vineyards. Roverto played a significant role in protecting the country and the villagers continue to honour the brave soldiers who fought for freedom.

Sorrento was a memorable stop where a waiter even kissed Faye on the hand! After a night of rain, thunder and lightening, they woke up to a gorgeous day and were able to appreciate the beachfront, fishermen, the amazing architecture and the character of this lovely seaside community.

Sorrento, like many Italian cities, has many archaeological sites and is a city that shows its history and age. From Sorrento, they ventured onto Mt. Etna with its grim site and sordid history. A month after their visit the nasty volcano erupted again! Agrigento was an interesting but frustrating community to navigate as its narrow streets and tight turns made it difficult for a car to navigate. The spectacular sites of the Valley of Temples made the trip well worth it. There were 3 well-preserved large temples and fabulous views of the ocean. Palermo, the main city in Sicily, was there next stop. Palermo is the New York of Sicily with endless historical attractions, and stunning large trees in the lovely botanical gardens. In Palermo they embraced a major celebration with parades, horses, re-enactments, lots of locals and tourists and the police keeping a close eye on some protestors.

They then took a train, filled with gypsies, to Pompeii. After receiving 6 different maps of the archaeological site and an auditory tour guide that made no sense, they just walked through the 66 hectare site interpreting things as they saw fit. They could see how Pompeii had been a massive city prior to its destruction and is now a major tourist and archaeological site. Many of the items found at the dig sites have been taken to other museums throughout the



country. From Pompeii, they took a bus to Matera – also known as the city of caves. There are two main valleys on either side of a large cathedral. The older caves in the valley are now a Unesco site and are being preserved. Other caves are being restored and are now stores, hotels and restaurants. During the 1970's, this area was the shame of Italy as families with up to 6 children were living in squalor with no water, electricity of sewer. These families were relocated but now their children are returning and trying to claim the land. Some of the caves were churches, in fact, the bible refers to these caves and many believe the area is a spiritual center and the people were chosen to live there.

Time was running out and so Faye was unable to tell us about her adventures to Dubrovnik, Milan, Rome, Vienna Amsterdam and Budapest. She feels privileged to have been able to have this amazing experience and looks forward to her next adventure abroad and her next visit to Italy to visit family.

Ed Borisenko thanked Faye for her interesting talk and presented her with a Rotary pen.
