Charles offered an inspiring new President's speech. (Abridged version)

I'm honored to accept the presidency of this club. I will do my best to live up to your expectations. I appreciate



the confidence. My 10 years with club have been very rewarding getting to know each and everyone of you through Club projects, Club committees, Club activities, personal friendships, personal mentorship, business mentorship, solicited advice and of course the ever popular unsolicited advice. I couldn't asked for a better group of friends, colleagues and associates. There's a great dignity in being a Rotarian. Other organizations come and go but Rotary continues because there's something here that speaks to everyone of us. Our club has a 99 year history in Nanaimo. All sizes, shapes, races, creeds, religions and lifestyles are welcomed and molded into a single organization that helps others through the instruments of peace.

These Instruments are understanding, friendship, education, resources for medical care, clean water and food. The instruments of peace are used to improve conditions of those who live in poverty, under strife, conflict, ignorance and fear. As Rotarians we all play our own small role in deploying the instruments of peace. For 120 years Rotary has demonstrated that people can live, work, share and serve together.

We shown it's possible to have one world Organization committed to friendship, cooperation and volunteer service leading to peace.

This is true even with all the differences of philosophy, religion, language, customs and political organization. The long history of rotary conveys expectations, assumptions and understandings about individual Rotarians. It's understood as a Rotarian that you have integrity and practice fair dealings. That you are honest. That your word is good. That you can be trusted. I found it to be true in my 10 years as a Rotarian. I first join the Club after conversation with my father-in-law in which he mentioned that the Rotarians he's known have all been good people. Coming from some-

one who's very candid of opinions this meant a lot.

We have differences in our club. There are all types of



personalities from the eager to the cynical. From the constantly cheerful to the constant curmudgeon, The super productive to the not so productive, the US Americans to the Canadians and all following the rotary goal Service Above Self. Everyone joins Rotary voluntarily and chooses to remain voluntarily. And everyone

helps in their own way and at their own pace. There are members who will have a lot on their plate this year and may not be able to give a lot. That's okay. There are members who will be putting in hundreds of hours in the book sale or other rotary projects. That's okay, it's actually very good. There are Rotarians who don't like the rain and will leave us for five months. That's okay, if they come back with a gift. Rotary is a long-term commitment and the same person who may not be able to give a lot this year could be the one who heads up a school building project in Ghana next year. Or a project in Mexico. Or an expedition to Nepal. How many members do we know who travel somewhere, see a humanitarian issue, come back to the club and throw all their time and energy into resolving it through Rotary. We all have access to the instruments of peace.

I hope to be a president who supports the club without pushing an agenda. What we do this year will be your decision. And the initiatives we take on will be your initiatives. If There's a bottleneck or an administrative issue I'll take care of it. Other than that do what you do best. There's a business adage that says you should

concentrate on building your strengths. If a member has great motivation to work on a service committee but doesn't like public relations, we won't put them in public relations just to fill the spot. If there's a committee that has very low volunteer interest that committee may have to die on the vine. Let's have fun this year.

We're not going to do things just for the sake of doing them. We'll do them because we want to. Because it promotes instruments piece. Because they have a champion or several champions in the Club. So again let's have fun. This will be a team effort as my golf team this afternoon will quickly find out. My weaknesses far exceed my strengths. So it depends on all of you. I will play my role to the best of my ability. I look very much forward to the year ahead and I thank you all again for all your support and your confidence.
