Program Notes – International Services Committee by Denise Wittkofski

Jane introduced Norman Myden, past president, multiple Paul Harris awards, 36 years experience and chair of the International Services committee. Norman highlighted his committee's activities and along with Ross White and Christine Parsons discussed the many its projects, with a budget of roughly \$29,400.00.

Projects include:

- Africa:
 - Ghana global grant application addressing disease prevention and treatment, maternal and child health, basic education and literacy, economic and community development
 working with Rotary District, Rotary International and the government of Canada. Once approved, the committee will come to the club to discuss in detail.
 - o Sunyani, Ghana
 - Primary school: built a latrine, literacy projects and water and sanitation projects
 - KCMC Aids Orphanage Rotary funding helps serve children with disabilities
 - Mercy Ships hospitals on ships go to poor countries, doing many surgeries and medical and dental procedures
 - Sleeping Children transformed the lives of

over 1.5 million children in developing countries by providing bed kits for a good night's sleep


• **Tembo, Kenya** –partners with individuals and communities in Western Kenya to support entrepreneurial activities, education and health through training programmes, scholarships, water and sanitation projects

• Latin America

- Etta Projects, Bolivia provides training and education to empower participants with tools to make sustainable changes in their lives. Named after Etta, a Rotary youth exchange student who was killed while on a trip in Bolivia. Nanaimo North is also involved in this project.
- Project Amigo, Mexico transforming lives through education. Ross has participated several times and encouraged everyone to participate. The cost is ~\$1200US/person and including accommodations and food. Ross claims this is a great "feel good" Mexican holiday to support elementary education.
- La Penita Rotary, Mexico an all schools project north of Puerto Vallarta on the beach. A lot of Rotary members from Vancouver Island are also members of the La Penita RC. Frank Shoemaker and Ross have been to this club several times.
- Guatemala Literacy Project a network of individual Rotarians, Rotary clubs and districts, and the nonprofit organization Cooperative for Education, that has a common interest in improving education for under served students in Guatemala. It is one of the largest grassroots, multi-club, multi-district projects in Rotary, with over 500 participating clubs throughout its 20year history.
- **Disaster Relief** in response to the flood of refugees from Rakhine, Mynanmar into Bangladesh, we supported the emergency efforts of Shelter Box & CARE (\$1000 each). At the end of March there were still over 880,000 refugees living in Cox's Bazar, over 70% of whom where women, children and infants.
- Mid Island Group membership consists of 24 Rotary clubs on Vancouver Island north of the Malahat. The clubs pay annual membership fees, used to provide grants to member clubs that are involved in international projects.

Norman concluded his presentation by encouraging members to get involved with any of these hands-on projects.

Due to a lack of time, **Doug Cowling** and **Wendy Pratt** agreed to postpone their presentation for the Community Grants Committee.
