


John Shillabeer reminded the members of the Book Club Committee that they would be meeting after today's Club meeting to discuss the upcoming book sale.



Introducing both Chris Beaton, Executive Director of Nanaimo Aboriginal Center and Ian Kalina, Executive Director of the Boys & Girls Club of Central Vancouver Island was Bob Janes.

Both speakers were passionate about community development. Chris has been 20 years in the non profit sector and is a father of 4 sons. Ian has been with Boys & Girls club for 10 years and is father of 1 boy and 1 girl and has been in the non profit sector for 27 years. Both have a lot in common including partnership in development of programs for education of aboriginal youth and children.



One year ago when they opened the Centre they had no staff, no programs and a \$12,000 budget. This vear their budget is \$165,000 and they project a budget of \$200,000 for next vear and have come a long way developing programs. Their focus is to not do things on their own and they have built bridges on all programs with partners who can help provide the service. The focus has been on what works so that the youth can graduate by not duplicat-

ing existing service but trying different approaches. In the coming year, they are working with VIU to evaluation their service delivery.

Some of the programs and activities are as follows:

- First urban public school opened • last year -the elementary center is hosted inside the Boys and Girls club.
- Aboriginal Hippy-preschool youngsters learning at home. Once a week teachers pass on literacy skills to parents and students who are learning at home. The parents have to make a commitment to 5 hours of schooling for the preschool youngsters each week.
- National Aboriginal day—over 900 community members attended at Bowen park
- Aboriginal Family Night- meant to provide social interaction for the families, a nutritional meal for the students and development of the Aboriginal culture.
- Aboriginal scholarship fundcurrently 1/3 to $\frac{1}{2}$ of the high school students do not graduate. This fund focuses on the younger youth. Aboriginal childcare costs covers off family portion of childcare so they can attend Boys & Girls Club for free.
- Outreach Aboriginal is a program that looks for Aboriginal families, going door to door, to find those families with children so they can reach out and help them. This has been very successful, their goal is in 20 months to reach out to 150 families, to date in 6 months they have reached 62 families

In partnership with Rotary, NAC has sent a student to RLA and together with Joan Rvan they have put together some Christmas hampers for needy families.

Our next speaker was Ian Kalina. Ian spoke of the partnership with Chris Beaton. Ian mentioned that Nanaimo child poverty rates are one of the highest in BC. He is interested in innovation and the Nanaimo Abo-

riginal Centre partnership with Boys and Girls Club has been very successful and energizing.

Some of the Questions about the program:

Question-How many students? 14, Kindergarten to Grade 3, with a capacity to double with second classroom. A single teacher's capacity is to 16 students. They plan to add Grade 4 in September.

Aboriginal Scholarship Fund? It has been determined that davcare is more expensive than university!

Aboriginal graduation rates have gone from 29% to 53% but are still far behind non-aboriginal rates. Everyone agreed it is amazing how far NAC has come and achieved in 18 months with action at the local level without waiting for delayed government action.



Doug Cowling thanked both speakers and was very excited for the city and the community to have such a good partnership and such good people. Each speaker received a coveted handmade Rotary pen.
