Program Notes, March 16, 2018 by Denise Wittkofski Adrian Legin: Coastal Community Credit Union

Mike Minhaus introduced speaker Adrian Legin,



CEO of the Coastal Community Credit Union (CCCU). With an MBA from Queen's University, Adrian focuses on issues that help build healthier regions and communities.

Adrian prefaced his talk by thanking Rotary "for all the work you do in our community" and was energized by being at our meeting. He noted that

his presentation would be quick as he was hoping to have more dialogue with the members. His talk began by defining credit unions as "full financial services cooperatives." They are regulated entities, just like all the banks and compete in a highly competitive market.

CCCU has a democratically elected board of directors and are very proud of the very strong governance. Adrian and various board members go through special training and are certified as professional directors.

Some distinctions: All profits that CCCU makes goes go back into the community, much like the connections that Rotary has with the community. CCCU was asked to join an international group and chosen by its leaders as one of five credit unions in Canada as one of the most innovative.

Credit Unions and Caisse Populaires (in Quebec) are the leaders in small business lending in Canada, contributing \$6.5B directly and indirectly to Canada's GDP. Credit unions also directly and indirectly employ more than 58,000 Canadians.

Adrian stressed that credit unions and caisse populaires are the major lenders to small businesses in Canada. Although this is an honor that they share with one of the largest banks, collectively focusing on small businesses is very important.

CCCU, like its counterparts, is "different on purpose," and is not solely profit-driven, although its roots as a cooperative were to help particular groups, such as farmers, to work together to ensure they could fulfill a market need.

Having been in business for 70+ years, its head office is located in the Diana Krall plaza in Nanaimo, is the largest Island-based financial institution, and is in the top ten credit unions by size in Canada.

Making the connection to Rotary, CCCU is "different on purpose" by putting all of its profits back into the communities it serves. Its vision is to build healthy communities and enrich people's lives--from helping people get their first homes to buying their first cars to supporting the small businesses that are the life blood of the Island.

CCCU is locally purposed, has a strong understanding of the environment and has local decision-making. Its vision—the "why" of CCCU—is building relationships that:

- Improve financial health
- Build healthier communities
- Enrich people's lives



CCCU's greatest strength: Its people. Adrian is proud to be a part of this team, having joined nine years ago and saw its strength as "people that care about people." Its focus on engagement is much like the work Rotarians do, engaging with people and helping people locally.

CCCU prides itself in leadership innovation.

Particularly, it was the first to lend to women in their own names. Brenda Grice said: "I remember that!"
