



Rotary Centennial Project Possibilities

Brenda Grice introduced the speaker **Kirsty McDonald**, city of Nanaimo Parks



and Open Space Planner who spoke about possibilities for the Centennial Project. Kirsty as well as Brenda is a landscape architect. Kirsty was born and raised in Nanaimo, plays piano and harp and is an avid kayaker.

In 2020 Rotary will be 100 years old, our Centennial Project must be planned and constructed within the next five years to be ready for 2020. As Kirsty explained there are several possible projects that could fit this time line within the Maffeo Sutton Park.

Areas that need improvement and could be considered for the Centennial Project are as follows:

- 1. Playground-some of the playground should have been removed over five years ago and definitely needs to be upgraded. This upgrade would last approximately 25 years.
- Performance space-there is a lot of need for additional performance space besides the Lions Pavilion. There have been suggestions of portable buildings that could be raised for special events.
- Creation of more places to actually touch the waterfront. A safe fishing area to fish pink salmon and access points to get to the water would definitely enhance the Park
- 4. Artwork—outdoor art work anywhere from \$5,000 to \$150,000 could enhance the waterfront
- Swy-a-lana Lagoon-is near the end of its cycle. There are a lot of issues with the erosion of concrete and pipes to prevent water contamination. This

- replacement project would last approximately 20 years. This could include opportunities to connect the Lagoon to other areas of the Park.
- 6. More youth facilities such as a skate park
- New Washroom Building that would possibly incorporate other amenities such as commercial retail space. The cost of a New Washroom Building would be from \$1.5 million and up the washrooms were built in the 1970. It is estimated a new washroom building would last 50 years.
- 8. Other improvements—walkway along the shore, seating area and environment improvements

Kirsty not only offered pictures of the existing areas that needed improvements but with each suggestion she offered visual examples of sites in Canada that have incorporated one of the improvements in their recreation space. Kirsty ended her speech by saying the city would be very excited to partner with Rotary. The City will be developing concrete illustrations of improvements for Maffeo Sutton Park to be ready for public input by the end of 2015.

Some of the guidelines from the legacy committee was accessibility to the water-front and visibility of our contribution and Kirsty believes that improvements to the park could fit into this criteria. Our club expects to raise around \$500,000 of the money toward the project. Kirsty provided the members with the Maffeo Sutton Park Improvement Plan map to see areas that can be improved.

Brent Stetar thanked Kirsty for providing us with some visual references and

also comparisons to other communities which has been very helpful.

ROTARY WINS PRESTIGIOUS SILVER TELLY FOR AIDS DOCUMENTARY

A documentary

film produced by Rotary's broadcast media department that features Rotary member Marion Bunch and her work to prevent the spread of HIV/AIDS in underprivileged African communities won two 2015 Telly Awards.

The prestigious awards are

given annually to the finest film and video productions. Rotary's documentary, "Rotary Family Health Days" received a Silver Telly, the highest honor, in the online video-documentary category, and a Bronze Telly in the online video-branded content and entertainment category. The documentary was shown by the South African Broadcasting Corporation and throughout Africa.

"What we tried to accomplish with the film was to get the good news and the good deeds out there so that the non-Rotary world can see it." says producer Andrew Chudzinski. "It was a great collaborative project."

The film documents the tremendous burden HIV/AIDS places on African families and communities. It covers the journeys of two women: South African grandmother Me Maria, who is raising her two grandsons whose parents died of AIDS, and Bunch, from Atlanta, Georgia, USA, who became a global advocate for AIDS prevention and the inspiration for Rotary Family Health Days after she lost her son to the disease.

"Because of that one single tragedy, my life's journey changed dramatically, from a very engaged businesswoman to a warrior on AIDS and advocate of human rights," Bunch told senior White House staff in October, when she was honored as one of 10 Rotary Women of Action for 2014. A member of the Rotary Club of Dunwoody, Bunch is the founder and CEO of Rotarians for Family Health and AIDS Prevention, a group of members that collaborates with Rotary clubs and districts on healthrelated projects.

The Rotary Health Days project, now in its fifth year and supported by Rotary clubs in Africa, has grown to deliver free basic health care, including HIV/AIDS screening and other preventive services, to underserved communities in Ghana, Nigeria, South Africa, and Uganda. It began in 2010, when Ugandan Stephen Mwanje, then governor of District 9211, asked Bunch if the Rotarian group would organize a multisite, comprehensive health event.more
