
necessarily need to die to be remembered. Doug pointed out: "that's the fast track".

## **Program Notes:**

Dave Connolly introduced today's speaker, Toni Wheeler.



Toni is the Executive Director of Eden Gardens, and a member of the Nanaimo North Rotary Club. She has 25 years' experience in healthcare in Alberta, Saskatchewan and British Columbia. Toni holds RN and MBA degrees; her background includes extensive clinical experience and effective labour management. She is passionate about community outreach and involvement.

The Eden Gardens facility is owned and operated by the Nanaimo Traveler's Lodge Society (NTLS), which is a leader in health and elder care and which has been supported by Rotary on an ongoing basis. The facility is not-for-profit, subsidized by Island Health and no private payment from residents or residents' families is needed. Nobody is turned away for financial reasons. Construction onsite began in 2015 and was completed in 2017. It is now a fully-functional elder care facility.

Toni thanked Rotary for 30 years of support to the NTLS. She then discussed the many avenues of support that are provided by the center, and the philosophy of care they practice. Their over-riding philosophy is an understanding that residents are independent individuals deserving of respect and compassionate care. Residents are allowed to determine much of their daily routine. Therapy programs of music, art, horticulture, and drama stimulate activity and interest.



Toni Wheeler explained the Eden Garden philosophy.

The center is organized into individual areas with 11 residents each. Areas are similarly laid out and contain slightly different features; the ground floor areas have outdoor access with gardens and fountains, while the upstairs areas have balconies. All contain kitchens for light baking, and some have resident pets, which can be helpful in lifting the mood.

Eden Gardens provides loving companionship, meaningful activity, and necessary medical treatment to honor elders, while extending the dignity of respect. Three "plagues" identified as affecting elders with dementia are hopelessness, loneliness, and boredom. The physical arrangement of Eden Gardens, with natural lighting and pleasant surroundings, and the meaningful discretionary activities allow residents to stay active and engaged in a supportive setting.

There were many comments and questions following the

presentation.

**Interact**. Interact clubs bring together young people ages 12-18 to develop leadership skills while discovering the power of Service Above Self. Find out how serious leadership can be seriously fun. Interact clubs connect with leaders in local communities and around the world.

Rotaract. Rotaract clubs bring together people ages 18-30 to exchange ideas with leaders in the community, develop leadership and professional skills, and have fun through service. In communities worldwide, Rotary and Rotaract members work side by side to take action through service. From big cities to rural villages, Rotaract is changing communities for the better. Rotaract clubs decide how to organize and run their club, manage their own funds, and plan and carry out activities and service projects aligned with causes

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA). RYLA is an intensive leadership experience organized by Rotary clubs and districts where young people develop leadership skills while having fun and making connections. RYLA events are organized locally by our district for high-school aged participant. District 5020 hosts two RYLA sessions, one in the Tacoma Washington area and one on Vancouver Island in British Columbia. Typically, events last 3 days and include presentations and activities covering a variety of topics.

Youth Exchange. Rotary Youth Exchange builds peace one young person at a time. Students learn a new language, discover another culture, and truly become global citizens. Exchanges for students 15 to 19 years old are sponsored by Rotary clubs in more than 100 countries. Long-term exchanges last a full academic year, and students attend local schools and live with multiple host families. Short-term exchanges last from several days to three months and are often structured as camps, tours, or homestays that take place when school is not in session.
