Innovation Island: Technology Happens Here

Paris Gaudet is the Executive Director of Innovation Island and has 15 years' experience in economic development, having held management and leadership roles in both public and private sector organi-

grams and services to assist early-stage tech companies. Paris is an "island girl", having been born in Campbell River and grew up in Nanaimo.

Innovation Island used to be known as MISTIC and underwent a name change in 2012 to better reflect their purpose. Innovation Island's goal is simple: support entrepreneurs to start and grow technology companies by providing them with programs and resources they need to succeed.

The organization has a large territory, supporting 79 municipalities, 8 Regional Districts, and 13 School Districts from the Malahat north including the Sunshine Coast and Gulf Islands. Their goal is to make technology the number one economic driver in the region.

Innovation Island has two funding



partners; BC Innovation Council and (federally) the National Research Council. They have to areas of focus; Community building – getting the word out, making presentations, hosting events

and seminars, and Entrepreneurial development – structured programs that support technology entrepreneurs to accelerate and grow. Their regional impact – worked with 91 companies, raised \$1.5m in capital funding, \$400K in gov't grant, \$840K in revenue generated, 33 full time jobs and 35 partnership agreements.

You may ask, what is technology? Building product and/or productized services with engineering attributes that are scalable to national or international markets. Tech startups share characteristics of rapid growth, innovative, visionary, scalable to global markets and are culture driven. Tech now employs more people in our province than oil, gas and forestry. Stats from 2013 show \$23 billion in annual economic impact, wages are 65% higher than BC averages, and involves over 40,000 businesses- although they may only have 1-2 employees.

Paris cited the "Club Penguin" story – an online software game developed as a safe, advertising-free game for young children developed by two dads in Kelowna, BC. They eventually sold to Walt Disney Corporation for \$700m fuelling the development of Kelowna as a tech industry town – key to successful
