Frank Shoemaker then stepped up to remind us that **Lila** has started collecting for Rotary Foundation, and she asked Frank to find a video to illustrate what happens to funds given to foundation. A great example is the Guatemala literacy project, supported by us for 10

years. We are 1 of about 200 clubs that contribute to it. Clubs contribute about \$200k, district about \$140k, and Government of Canada another \$40k, plus more. All together, about \$700k is contributed to this project. In Feb 2019, there is an opportunity for any of us to go to Guatemala to participate in the activities, and we will hear more about this in future. The 2.5 min video presented by Frank shows how this has project has impacted the Community and school in the area. APRIL 2018 BOOK SALE A HUGE SUCCESS! We've come a long way in 10 years.

Janeane Coutu, Chairperson of the Book Sale Com-



mittee reported on the book sale results! The organizing for this sale began with the conclusion of the fall 2017 sale. Rotarians began the job of collecting, sorting and storing books which occurred every day but Christmas. The book sale began with the setup on Thursday evening April 12. Over 100,000 books were put

on display. The sale ran from Friday April 13th to Sunday April 22nd. We had a total of 85 unique volunteers that filled 260 shifts. Seventy three percent of the shifts were filled by Rotarians from our own club!!! (This

We sold about 56,000 books with total sales of over \$92,000!!!! This is a new record for the spring sale, job well done!

The job was so well-prepared and so well-executed that they were walking out to cars by 6:10, and beer was being consumed by 6:30. On all points, that's a

record! This year, 21 out of 36 schools used vouchers which is excellent.

Congrats to us! Other shifts were filled by spouses of Rotarians in this club, Altrusa, Rotarians from other clubs, and volunteers from Literacy Nanaimo.

Janeane emphasized a HUGE thanks to Nanaimo North Town Centre for hosting us again at \$0 cost. They are an incredible supporter, and Janeane emphasized that we could all choose to use merchants in that mall, as we could not do this without them.

A few more thank yous: Lucy Gosselin for organizing the bankers and cashiers, Rudy and Brent who are there virtually every single day of the year, except Christmas. Another point from **Janeane** is that our donations *doubled* as soon as signs went up. The book donation bin was emptied up to twice a day, plus more stacked outside the bins, proving that our signage works!!! Program Notes for April 27, 2018

Program -VIU nurses to Mexico

David Woodward introduced the speakers for today who are two of his fellow co-workers at VIU.

Lynn Rollinson worked for VIU for 25 years and has



held many facility positions in the HAS, LPN and RN programs. Lynn completed her PhD in 2015 and she is pursuing research pertaining to student learning and international learning. **Mary Anne Holby** has been on faculty of the BSN program at VIU since January 2003. She has travelled extensively in Europe

and Asia. She has taught across all levels of the BSN program and has a passion for nursing practice with students.

Mary Ann explained the partnership that Nursing

department of VIU has with the Non-profit organization **Apoyo a Gente Emprendedora** in San Miguel de Allende, Guanajuato, Mexico. Apoyo helps poorer people in Mexico either start

their own business or strengthen existing ones to help break the cycle of poverty in this Mexican community. Apoyo was started by **Ezequiel Mojicac** who came from poverty himself and feels very passionate about trying to keep the Mexican families together by creating successful businesses in Mexico, instead of the fathers and children having to leave to work in El Norte (USA). It has made over 200 loans and has been in existence since 2004. The organization began to realize that the success of breaking the poverty cycle was not just about building successful businesses but about many other contributing factors and has developed many innovative programs.

The Nursing department of VIU joined Apoyo in a working partnership about three years ago, to improve health education particularly around sex education. Nursing students gain work experience outside of Canada while helping to promote health education in the community as part of one of the Apoyo's programs. In San Miguel for the past two years the partnership has

evolved. In the first year (2016) fourteen third year nursing students went and they primarily involved with health promotion and education with the adolescents in the area. It was a time of relationship building and sharing of life stories and understanding what they had in common. In the second year, in 2017 nine fourth year nursing students went and did a lot of the same presentations but also where in involved in measuring the effect of the program.

When Lynn and Mary Ann went back they amazed at the change in the community that they worked at the year before. For example, there was a Mexican lady who had 14 children (11 of them boys that had gone to work in the US whom she had not seen for 17 years and as well as grandchildren who she had never seen) who at age 70 opened up a bakery with the help of Apoyo and has been very active in the community. One of the Apoyo programs -- the moms' program-- involves sustainable food supply and they have been teaching the women how to garden. Where the people lived is very rustic and Apoyo connected them with federal and state funding as well as Rotary funding to improve the buildings they lived in and improve the water systems and sanitation. Another Apoyo program is involved with children, teaching them to dream bigger and how to give back into the community.

The Nursing department from VIU has been involved primarily in the moms' program and health education. For example, they did an exercise with a number of balloons to illustrate the difficulty of substance abuse and juggling other areas of their life. Based on what they learned from the two visits, they realize there are big visions for the community. The students participated in an evaluation exercise involving the people of the community which helped shape future goals for the community and one of the goals was to bring health services into the community. They want improvements in the current services, perhaps by bringing in a mobile health clinic. Apoyo is looking at what would be the appropriate model and coming up with long and short-term plans.

The students that are coming in San Miguel this November will be involved in training community health workers as part of the short-term plans of bring health services into the community. They will be involved in training the trainer on basic medical services, in addition part of the nurses' assignment is researching how to apply and implement the long-term vision of permanent health care. Mary Ann mentioned that are many other programs that are being initiated by Apoyo and VIU could partner with them in different areas such as Child

and Youth Care. **Mary Ann** said the programs is growing by leaps and bounds.

One of the projects the students did was a video that explained what they got out of the trip to Mexico and what it means to them, for many it has a big transformation.

Some of the nurses have taken volunteer jobs in the country they come from. The impact to the student has been significant after seeing poverty, poor water, lack of education and comparing it to what they have at home, they realize how little it takes to make changes for the best. About twelve students a year are selected each year and the students have to pay for their own travel costs. But as Mary Ann and Lynn both said it is not just a trip but an education on helping others.

Susie Stephens thanked the speakers and as a retired nurse she understands how important her practicum was and how it changed her life.
