
Notices of Motions

management. She works as a Financial Analyst for the Provincial Government. Marina speaks five languages and was part of the Rotary exchange to Netherlands, she also studied abroad in Mexico. She has attended to the World Girl Guide centre in Narvaka.

Marina pointed out that Girl Guides of Canada and Rotary have a lot in common, they both foster



associations abroad. Girl Guides encourages confidence in girls and works to broaden their horizon. Their trip to Japan in 2018 was to have Girl Guides learn more about Japan. Marina asked all Rotarians who were Boy Scouts, Brownies or Girl Guides to stand and many of Rotarians present stood. When thinking about Girl

Guides many people think about Girl Guide cookies or Girl Guide motto of "Caring is Sharing, or Sharing is Caring". Girl Guides mean different things to different people their vision is a better world, by girls. The mission is to be a catalyst for girls empowering girls. Guides have a core program that has seven competencies which allow girls and young women to develop life and career skills.

One of the international activities is to teach peace and the visit to Japan in 2018 was one of the initiatives. The Kansai region of Japan hosted the sixteen girls and four leaders who went to Japan. They were all interested in living in Japan and seeing the Japanese culture. The Guides were presented with tokens when they arrived. The tour was divided into three parts, the first part is when they stayed with the host club, the second part was when they went to camp, and finally, on a sightseeing tour. At the welcome party, the Japanese Girl Scout leaders dressed in traditional dress and trading gifts with the Canadian Guides. All kinds of crafts and badges were exchanged. The Japan Girl Scout camp was near a ski resort area and operated by the Outward Bound. The camp activity included a waterfall climb and swimming. Girls divided into Patrols and shared activities together, learning similarities and differences. They then went on to tour Japan from the Camp. The

Guides went to eat at Obento and learned how to be adventurous with different foods. Some of the places they visited were as follows:

- 1. A Bomb Dome, Hiroshima-a park and museum it is meant to encourage hopes of peace.
- 2. Itsukushima, a shrine near Hiroshima where they made cookies and decorated a noodle rice scoop.
- 3. Mt. Misen, Miyajima which was very hot-45 degrees, and they hiked up the mountain. Monks come here to seek enlightenment.
- 4. Chawan-zaka-(Teapot lane), where they went to a teapot ceremony.
- 5. Inari, Shrine- which is the top tourist spot. They went to honor this shrine.
- Then they returned to Osaka which is a big city metropolis. This is where they tried baby octopus with quail eggs. They enjoyed lots of Poke Man shops.



- 7. Nara Park where deer were revered, and they could buy special deer cookies
- 8. Todaji Temple-another Unesco Heritage sight and the largest statue of Buddha.
- 9. Kiyomizu-dera Temple, Kyoto where they got to dress up in traditional dress.

Finally there was reflections, they brought thousands of cranes to the Peace Park. In conclusion, Japan was very different in a good way and the cultural understanding will continue with the Girl Guides that went.

Question-Janeane Coutu asked at what age is Girl Guides? Answer-ages 9 to 11 for Guides; Pathfinders 12-14; and Rangers 15-17.

Question- Doug Anderson asked what is the difference between Girl Guides and Girl Scouts? Girl Guides was started in Britain and in the US it was Girl Scouts, in essence members are of the same organization.

Question-Did you feel any earth quake shocks in Japan?

No there was not any shocks, but they did have a tropical storm when they were there.

Rebecca Taylor, a Brownie in the 1970's, thanked the Marina and gave her a Rotary pin.
