

VIU: A Research Institute

The programme today was VIU – A Research Institute, presented by Trevor Davis, Ph.D.



Carey McIver introduced Dr. Trevor Davis as the VIU Associate Vice President of Scholarship and Community Engagement. Dr. Davis is a geographer by training. He completed his uni-

versity work at the University of Victoria and the University of British Columbia, then worked for several years in the forestry industry. Following that, Dr. Davis worked with the University of Utah, Thompson Rivers University, and Mt. Royal University before coming to VIU.

Dr. Davis then expanded upon his

role in this new position. He recently came to VIU in July of this year, and is focussed mainly on fostering an interactive relationship between VIU and the community, with a major emphasis on community involvement. This relationship identifies issues within community groups that can then use VIU's resources to find solutions and explore new opportunities. The focus for Dr. Davis's work is less on academics and more on supporting community research.

Program

The VIU academic plan has a mandate to support the community well-being of Vancouver Island. The mandate consists of two parts: research and teaching and Dr. Davis's area concentrates on re-



search. Four research chairs are supported through VIU, including two Regional Innovation chairs, and two Canada Research chairs.

Some major areas of research at VIU include Coastal Resource Development, Shellfish Research, and the Applied Environmental Resource Laboratory. The latter has an exciting project in the production of a mobile research laboratory capable of monitoring pollutants at remote sites in real time with sophisticated sampling equipment. Student involvement on these research projects is key to their success, and the further involvement of independent community groups greatly increases the scope of coverage possible. Students benefit greatly from the hands-on work with these projects, with many opportunities to publish papers and many students move directly into graduate work based on the experience received with VIU.

Community groups currently working with VIU include the Parksville and Qualicum Center for Healthy Aging, the Center for Healthy Communities, and the Institute for Coastal Research. Another area falling under Dr. Davis's oversight is VIU's support of First Nation learning; currently, VIU is the largest university supporter of First Nation learning in the country, with over 10%

THANK SPEAKER of the students of First Nations background.

VIU is in a strong position to further community involvement as the individual faculty are closely tied to their communities, and many have been participating in outreach efforts for years. Dr. Davis welcomes input from the various outreach efforts, and the identification of new areas that may benefit both outreach groups and VIU.

A number of questions were asked by the audience:

City councillor **Fred Pattje** mentioned that during his 6 years on the council, he has several times heard about the possibility of a VIU satellite center in the downtown core, and is wondering if this could be on the horizon? Dr. Davis said that he is aware of a number of similar successes in this area, and also a number of failures, and said that this type of an arrangement can work if it is given a lot of support and a specific agenda.

John Shillabeer mentioned that a Makerspace recently opened, and was wondering if this may be an area for collaboration? Dr. Davis said that he is

personally a great supporter of Makerspaces, and is very interested to learn more about this one, specifically as it may benefit specific VIU departments.

Brenda Grice noted that *VIU Rota*ract *President* **Erin Lee** is in attendance at today's meeting, and asked whether the Rotaract group would be an outreach group that would work with the Research group? Dr. Davis said this is absolutely a group he is interested in working with.



Dave Hammond thanked the speaker, and noted that our club has a lot of involvement with VIU, with many members currently serving on VIU board, and that we can see the importance of this new position. The coveted Rotary pen was presented to our speaker.
