Seniors Eye Health and Eye Disease

Norm Myden introduced Dr Paul Geneau, noting his



very active membership in Rotary since 1981, including stints as president of Nanaimo North Club and Assistant District Governor, together with his leadership in several professional societies.

Eye disease is a growing problem in Canada because of our aging population. After age 40, the number of cases of vision loss doubles every ten years. Vision loss in the aged leads to serious knock-on ef-

fects including falls, depression, more people needing to live in a nursing home and eventually death.

Dr Geneau focussed his talk on two of the most common diseases of the eye among seniors: cataracts and macular degeneration.

Cataracts result from the natural aging of the lens. Cells in the lens continue to replicate throughout life, gradually adding to the thickness and the rigidity of the lens. As a result the lens is less flexible and less able to adjust to different focus points. It also becomes cloudy or hazy and lets in less light. Cataracts develop slowly and usually painlessly, so one is barely aware of their development. Risk factors for cataracts include aging, family history, sun exposure (UV rays), lifestyle choices (smoking), eye injury and certain medications (e.g. prednisone in high doses).

There are a number of easy precautions to minimise cataracts:

- wear sunglasses that block UV rays
- lead a healthy lifestyle
- eat a healthy diet rich in antioxidants
- have a regular eye exam

Fortunately cataracts are readily fixed through surgery. Dr Geneau said that surgery has advanced massively since first undertaken some thirty years ago. Today an artificial lens is usually placed under local anesthetic and only takes a few minutes.

Macular degeneration affects the cones in the central part of the retina. The cones are what we use for detailed vision. Macular degeneration is an age related disease that in its early stages shows no symptoms. As it develops vision becomes blurry and dark spots appear. There are two forms of Aged Macular Degeneration (AMD): dry and wet. Dry is more common but can progress to become wet. Wet is about 10% of all cases and usually results in more damage to the eye. AMD can now be treated through regular injections to stop the further development of the disease. It cannot be reversed.

Risk factors for AMD include:

- Age
- Lifestyle
- UV exposure
- Poor diet
- High blood pressure
- Family history

AMD is not preventable but the best precaution is regular comprehensive eye exams



(annually for those over 65). There are also vision aids for those with AMD including special magnifiers, video screens and low vision counselling.

In answering questions from the floor Dr Geneau said that transition lenses protect against UV light and that some contact lenses provide UV protection. Island Health does provide a screening program for children. However it is targeted only at certain diseases and therefore children should also be

seen by an eye doctor for a comprehensive exam.

President Debbie thanked Dr Geneau for sharing his expertise and presented him with a treasured Rotary pen.
