Summits of Hope

Our speaker on October 11th, **Dr. Randy Marback**, was introduced by

his sister and Rotarian Debbie Narver. Randy was born in Nanaimo, has two boys, loves to travel, is an adventurist and is a GP who has specialized in oncology and palliative care. Randy works in the Nanaimo Cancer Clinic and in the Palliative Care unit at NRGH. Randy has two boys, one of which has followed in his fathers footsteps into medicine. While at a medical conference, Randy ran into a colleague

named Randy Barstow. This is where Randy first learned about Summits of Hope - a group that raises money for children with cancer by climbing mountains around the world. Russ

Barstow, the founder and president, began *Summits of Hope* in 1999 in memory of his cousin Ben. Since its inception, *Summits of Hope* has raised over \$3 million dollars with every penny earned going directly to projects at *BC Children's Hospital*.

They raise money through their climbs, through gala dinners like the one recently held in Vancouver and through talks to groups such as Rotary.

Climbing teams consist of medical professionals from around the province. Team members pay their own way, purchase their own equipment and are passionate about supporting cancer care for kids. Although many of the team members are very experienced climbers, it is not mandatory for a team member to have climbed at all. Others will encourage and assist them through the journey.

A team left just this week to climb Mt. Kilimanjaro and when they reach the top, they will fly the flag that is signed by the children in the hospital.

Randy will be leaving soon to climb to base camp at Mt. Everest. Prior to the climb, he will be spending time in Nepal doing Palliative Care work. Randy will be taking students to do bedside teaching at a facility that is part of the *Nanaimo Hospice Partners in*

Compassion project. **Wendy Pratt** thanked Randy for taking on this extra work before his climb.

Randy has been wearing his hiking boots daily as part of his preparation

for the climb. Altitude and endurance are the two major obstacles that all climbers face. Starting in Katmandu, where the temperatures are about 15C, the 17 climbers will connect with their established crew of Sherpas and team support crew. The base camp is at 19,000 feet and temperatures are typically a high of -10 to -18C. Randy did reflect on the loss of the 10 Sherpas last vear which was a huge loss to the small village and a reminder of the extreme dangers that all climbers take on when ascending Mr. Everest. The 17 day climb will be hard work but an experience that is life changing.

Randy showed some pictures from previous climbs. Some of the breath taking scenic shots were taken at sunrise which means that climbers hiked through the night to be at the summit for the sunrise! Other photos showed team members working at an orphanage in Tanzania, going on safaris pre or post hiking, and the children in the cancer ward that is the heart of Summits for Hope.
