

Program - Vancouver Island Tourism by Peggy Richardson



Our speaker Calum Matthews, from Vancouver Island Tourism, spoke to us about the economic impact of tourism on our island community.

How many of us were visitors to Vancouver Island before we were residents? Tourism is everybody's business, regardless of your industry,

where you live, or even if you are retired.

Tourism supports job growth and community vibrancy.

Tourism broadens our tax base, which funds infrastructure, including ferry terminals and airports. The tourism industry is also key to the success of provincial health care, social services, infrastructure, and education. The increased \$1.2 billion in provincial taxes from the tourism industry feed all of this.

Tourism has experienced significant growth as a sector, creating 600k jobs in Canada and \$78 billion in spending. There is actually a 14-year increase streak, with now \$13 billion annual revenue in BC. Vancouver Island alone now has an annual 1.4b in overnight spending and 3.8 million visitors annually. Tourism is our largest primary resource industry in BC. Job creation in tourism is much more diverse than before, creating more than just front-line jobs, and wages and salaries are now catching up.

Tourism VI is a non-profit industry association. It was originally the Vancouver Island Publicity Bureau, which started as a group of Vancouver Island mayors who recognized that they needed greater industry diversification and longevity. Since then the organization has expanded, and while it is still focused on marketing, it now includes development such as helping business owners create and expand opportunities, and other "hands-on" work.

Tourism VI has no membership fee, and now follows

a stakeholder model, which allows many more participants. This means they don't just work with "the big guys". All businesses and other stakeholders are represented more fairly. The organization now focuses on Nanaimo and the north parts of the island, with special attention to infrastructure development projects, and other things that support growth.

We are still a great gateway for Asia, and attract many visitors with our scenic beauty, which is the tourism product people seek. The people here really do make a key difference in the experiences of visitors. How often has interaction with locals "made" a visitor's trip? That is what people want to share with friends and family, which plays a key role in growing our community.

What can we do to help this industry?

- 1. Show friends and family around when they are visitors, and show some VI pride.
- 2. Word of mouth makes a huge difference talk about places and things to see and do

here.

- 3. Take time to get to know your local tourism businesses.
- 4. Tell people about the destinations, and share your own stories.

Tourism is extremely political - it's a key economic sector, but we don't seem to hear much about it. We need great leadership to continue to grow, so please take it into account when you vote, and educate others about why we should be tourism supporters.
