Harmac—A Comeback Success

Wayne Anderson introduced our speaker, Paul Sadler, CEO of Nanaimo Forest Products Ltd. Originally from Montreal, Paul graduated from Queens University as a Chemical Engineer, and began his career at Harmac pulp mill in 1981.

Harmac went through various owners over its history, and closed in May 2008

due to the bankruptcy of then owner, US-based **Pope & Talbot**. In August 2008, after months of work and negotiations, a new company was formed called Nanaimo Forest Products Ltd. (NFPL) operating as Harmac Pacific. NFPL has three owner groups, none of which holds the controlling interest which is split 48%/27%/25%. Mill operations for the new company started in early October 2008.

The employees each bought in for \$25,000 to raise the required \$7 million in start-up financing. Today, 99% of employees own shares, and each new hire is given the one-time opportunity to buy in at the same \$25,000 investment amount, although their shares quantity is lower due to the rise in value. If they decline, they do not get another opportunity to purchase shares. Shares can only be sold after ending employment. About 99% of current employees are shareholders today, and one of the benefits of ownership is receiving super seniority.

NFPL is governed by a Board of six Directors, two from each holding company; the **Sampson Group**, **Pioneer Log Homes of NV**, and the **Harmac Employee Owner Group**. NFPL boast the best wages in the industry in the province, and operate their business on a pay-for-work model. This means they pay well per hour and pay for overtime. There is no banking overtime which can lead to liabilities, vacation is by the book, if an employee needs more time off they can apply for a leave of absence without pay. Their labour contract is an unprecedented term (2008-2019) negotiated with PPWC Local 8, and they practice an annual compensation review.

Harmac Pacific operates a Northern Bleached Softwood Kraft (NBSK). Today the mill boasts \$300 million in annual sales, has 330 active employees and completely BC-based ownership. There is tremendous co-operation between staff and management, much credited to the self-financed start-up of the new company. The new model has reduced staffing by 40% while maintaining the same level of production, and hourly cost per tonne was reduced by 40%. All employees contribute to the maximum of their skill set. The goals are simple:

- Retain competitive, profitable NBSK mill as host
- Leverage existing site infrastructure to diversify and increase revenue streams from alternative products and industries. One of which is Green Power Generation which has been completed.

Other ideas include secondary effluent treatment of community sewage, sawmill on site, land use for complimentary industrial uses, biorefinery opportunities in the future.



Since inception in 2008, NFPL has sold \$1.3 billion in product, has made a \$130 million capital investment, employees 330 people (270 unionized and 70 staff) with wages over \$100 million, municipal taxes exceed \$16 million and Provincial permit & license fees \$4 million. Annual production = 375,000 metric tonne of pulp using three dominant tree species; Cedar, Hemlock & Douglas fir. 100% of production is sold to papermakers making them an exportbased business. They operate their own deep-sea dock which allows them to focus on overseas export business. Employee ownership currently stands at 25% of the company equity. In a very competitive and low-margin industry, NFPL is a substantial business, reinvesting profits and



bringing economic benefits to Nanaimo and the province.

Our speaker was thanked by **Dave Hammond** for such an informative and interesting topic, and he presented Paul with the coveted wooden Rotary pen.

World Polio Day 2016 highlights Rotary's progress to end polio

Where are we in the fight to eradicate polio? What's left to do? And why does it cost so much? Rotary's **World Polio Day** event on **24 October** will answer these questions and more.

Health officials from our partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative will join Rotary leaders and special guests at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in Atlanta, Georgia, USA, to give a status update on the eradication campaign.

The wild poliovirus has caused fewer new cases of the disease so far this year than this time last year, but recent setbacks in Nigeria — which was re-classified as polio-endemic in September 2016 — underscore the need for vigilance.

Yet the detection of new cases in northern Nigeria also demonstrates that surveillance efforts are reaching children even in areas affected by conflict. The challenge now is to contain the outbreak and boost immunity in affected areas until the virus is eradicated worldwide.

This year also saw the largest and fastest vaccine rollout in history, as 155 countries and territories switched from the trivalent oral polio vaccine to the bivalent oral polio vaccine. The bivalent oral polio vaccine protects against the only two strains still in circulation and reduces the likelihood of vaccinederived cases.
