President Jane gave us a heads up of two agenda items which will be discussed at the 5-president meeting with Assistant Governor **Bev Hilton** next week. The first item is about RI president's challenge to have every Rotarian plant a tree between now and Earth Day 2018 which is April 22, 2018. The reaction from the members was not overly positive. Among other comments, there was discussion about possibly donating to organizations such as Tree Canada or Scouts Canada who already have that as a purpose instead of our club getting actively involved in it. The second item was the request for a \$500 donation from our club for an Aboriginal library. The members were quick to remind President Jane that such a request should be vetted by the Community Grants and Projects committee chaired by Doug Cowling. The committee has the resources & criteria for assessing recipients and their requests.

Speaker Notes for August 25, 2017 by John Shillabeer

Central Vancouver Island Multicultural Society - Kelly McBride

Christine Parsons introduced our speaker, **Kelly McBride**. She is the acting execu-



tive director of the Central Vancouver Island Multicultural Society. Kelly grew up in Nanaimo and about two years ago returned home after spending about twenty years in Liverpool UK, working in the non-profit Immigration Advisory Services.

Kelly showed a video to illustrate the scope of the Society's services and then answered questions from the floor.

The Society was formed in 1979, originally to help people displaced from the war in Vietnam. It is a registered charity and implements an holistic approach to helping new arrivals. There are numerous programs, but perhaps the most important are those involved with the settling in of new migrants, language training and work preparation. English language training and employment preparation go hand-in-hand, giving neither language nor work priority over the other. They have five class rooms for teaching English and provide instruction from kindergarten level to pre-university level. They also offer classes for illiterate migrants. There is a day care service for preschoolers. The day care and English classes are free. Employment preparation includes discussion of Canadian work place culture and practices as well as health and safety in the workplace. WorkBC is an important participant.

The Society offers support to migrants through a variety of programs, services and social activities. There are settlement workers who meet one-on-one with migrants upon arrival and regularly afterwards to help them get started with the basics of living in Nanaimo. There is a school readiness



program of in-home instruction for mothers with kids between 3 and 5 years old. This program is designed to keep the mothers

involved so that they subsequently take over as visitors in later years. This summer the Society started a youth group for teenagers. It organises trips and activities and is very popular. There are over thirty members. The society recently introduced a family matching program in which an immigrant family is matched with a local Nanaimo family of similar profile. They are encouraged to socialise and enjoy together what life has to offer in Nanaimo (e.g. picnics, sports).

The Society operates on an annual budget of about \$1.2 million. It is mostly funded by the federal and provincial governments, together with donations, e.g. from United Way.

Kelly told us that there are about 18 government sponsored and about 10 privately sponsored Syrian refugee families in Nanaimo. Some have adapted very well while for others life is tough and they are taking longer to get established. There are now fewer arrivals from Syria. The newest arrivals are mainly from Iraq and Eritrea.

The Society is notified of a new migrant family and arranges to meet them upon arrival. Government sponsored migrants usually stay in a hotel for up to six weeks and in that time a settlement worker helps them to find their way around, get registered with various government agencies, do shopping and banking, arrange for school, then find accommodation and furniture. Privately sponsored refugees are supported similarly by the Society.

There are many success stories. Many migrants have found work in a variety of trades and occupations and Kelly mentioned a barber, concrete finisher, baker and a tile installer. Kelly said that support from local small businesses has been very good. However recognition of foreign professional qualifications is problematic and can easily take 18 months.

In thanking the speaker and presenting her with a famed Rotary pen, **Bezhad Targhi** said that even though he did not come here as a refugee, he loved the organisation. He benefited a lot from their services and happily still visits the Society from time to time.
