A quick Program change was organized by **President Lila** when our planned guest speaker could not attend. Three visiting Rotarians told us about their clubs and club member Donna Hais gave us an update on the construction of Nanaimo Travellers Lodge Eden Gardens Project.



Our first speaker was Norman Wicks who is visiting with his wife Liz from Hexham Rotary Club in England. Hexham is where England joins Scotland and close to Hadrians Wall. His club has 35 members and he is a retired Police Officer who retired at 49 years of age. Norm's first wife was England's first double lung transplant patient who managed to extend her life for 11 years after her

operation. His current wife. Liz. was his first wife's best friend. They have two children.


Doug's club gets mainly involved in shipping containers of goods to countries for disaster relief. Bruce Gordon asked about their fundraising and Norm said that their fundraising was from donations from the community. President Lila presented Norm with our banner.




Donna Hais updated the Club on the progress of construction on Travellers Lodge on Northfield Road. The project is divided into neighbourhoods or pods in a homelike atmosphere. Individual rooms will be complete with their own washroom and shower. The total building area is 107,000 ft² with in-house kitchen and laundry facilities. There is a future phase of 130 units available within the site. It

is 2 floors of wood frame construction over a partial concrete basement area and includes an Adult Day Care and Bathing Program. Travellers is an Island Health funded pro-

ject with placement in the Lodge through Island Health. It has state of the art nurse call systems and will open in April 2017. Several questions from the club were answered by Donna and Janeane Coutu talked about her mom who had dementia and the important function for both the family and the per-



Our next speaker was Brent **Barootes** from the Calgary West Rotary Club which will be celebrating their 50th birthday in June 2017. Their club has between 65-70 members and their past
