**PROGRAM NOTES – TRIBAL JOURNEYS, September 7, 2018**By Wayne Anderson

Janeane Coutu introduced speaker Don Bonner.

Don started off by introducing himself in the traditional manner we are accustomed to in Canada. Then he re-introduced himself in the traditional manner of naming himself with his indigenous name, the name of his grandfather and the name of his father. Don is of the Algonquin tribe and a member of the 'bear clan'. The second introduction was significant in that it showed how the indigenous peoples have maintained their oral history in their culture.

Tribal Journeys first started in 1989, an idea was conceived that this would be an excellent way for the indigenous peoples along the coast to connect with each

other from Haida Gwaii in Canada to Puyallup in the USA. The Journeys are held every two years and the starting point alternates, one year the Journey starts in Canada and the next starts in the US. This year the Journey started in July with members of a Band in Haida Gwaii and traveled south, each Band has their own canoes and as the Journey continues members



of the Bands along the coastline are added. The area covered is approximately the same size as Rotary District 5020. The Journey ended near Tacoma, WA. The canoers typically travel 4-6 hours per day.

When the travelling group arrive at a new destination a strict protocol is followed. The group arriving sing as they enter the new band or tribe's territory and they can't get out of their canoes until the formal introductions are over, the arriving group must ask permission to come ashore. Once the formalities are over the entire group share a wonderful meal, followed by more singing and dancing. The dancers dance individually, usually with the males dancing as a group and the females as a group. A road crew follows on land as the Journey progresses, they are charged with setting up the camp for the paddlers.

The Journey will have about 120 canoes travelling together at the end and it can take up to 5 days for each canoe to introduce themselves. One has to keep in mind that there is no time limit for each speaker and everyone waits patiently for their turn. The oldest Canadian on this Journey was 76 years old. Each canoe is a family representing their territory.

Throughout his talk Don had a wonderful slide show of photos running and then he finished his talk with a five-minute video, 'Honouring Our Medicine' which highlighted a 4 year boy doing the warrior dance. Don's Journey was 10 days long and he enjoyed every minute of it.



Don Bonner is also a Rotarian with the Daybreak Club in Nanaimo, Yvan Gosselin thanked Don for his enjoyable and enlightening talk. Don was presented with a pen made by one of the members of our club.
