#### Announcements


Janeane Coutu announced that the book sale is getting

**SPEAKER NOTES from Sept. 8, 2017** by Peggy Richardson

#### **Kids International Development Society**

Adrianne Dartnall and Rick Lennert are the cofounders of the Kids International Development Society. (K.I.D.S.) This remarkable couple have expanded their society across the globe to help thousands of children, but it all started with every parent's worst nightmare, the loss of their beautiful and intelligent daughter Danielle. At only 21, Danielle was killed by a drunk driver in the year 2000. After the shock of this event, this couple chose to devote their lives to help others.

Their mission is to "create better futures for children in developing countries". They traveled to Cambodia,

where they saw the widespread and lingering impact of the regime of the Khmer Rouge. For the last 16 years, the couple has spent approximately 4 months a year in Cambodia, enabling them to personally oversee the society's improvement projects, and the distribution of funds.

The Society has made several education initiatives, such as building large and solid school buildings, and putting books in the school library. Other educationrelated initiatives include things like a solar lamp program, a bicycle program for travel to and from school, rebuilding a floating school in a rural area, and even a computer program.

Another family support initiative has been to support the Stung Treng Kindergarten and Women's Development Center, which provides not only job and personal training for women, but childcare as well. The women of this center create beautiful scarves, known as the Mekong Blue scarf, and which are now sold in various outlets online and in North America.

A special project is the Society's Girls Home, run by a woman named Yvette. Yvette lost her husband and children, and eventually her entire family, to the Khmer Rouge regime. She now cares for 13 orphaned or abandoned girls in a warm and loving atmosphere. She has also been trained by the UN as a social worker, and continues her work in a larger home, all with the support of K.I.D.S.

Water is a cornerstone of the Society's work. They have developed and executed several "water towers" and dispensing facilities, which support entire villages. Often built in conjunction with schools, these towers pump, store and filter water to a series of taps usable by the community. These towers use modern filtration

systems just like those in North America, and replace ancient systems of water collection that often led to waterborne diseases that could kill if left untreated in these rural areas.

The villages maintain these systems themselves, which means that they are sustainable and can run almost indefinitely. The cost to complete a tower is as little as \$7500 USD - including the cost of drilling the well - which is (excuse the pun) a drop in the bucket compared to many comparable systems built here in Canada.

All of the projects completed by the Society work to hire 99% local Cambodian labour. The Society has a 4% - 5% administration
