Richard Finnegan introduced Morgan Carey, who

was recently named as one of the 200 most powerful people in real estate. Morgan is CEO of Real Estate Webmasters Inc. Morgan grew up and went to school in Nanaimo, he later graduated from university after studying abroad and finding a unique

passion in search engine marketing. He founded Real Estate Webmasters in 2004. The award-winning company has been a rising star in the community and now boasts over 200 employees in three offices. Morgan owns 3 businesses and 5 buildings in Nanaimo. One business his REWSTERS restaurant offers his employees ½ off on all meals.

In 2013, Webmasters was awarded the workplace excellence award by the Greater Nanaimo Chamber of Commerce.

In 2014, Morgan Carey appeared on CBC's Dragons' Den, securing a record breaking \$40,000,000 valuation for which he subsequently turned down for an even larger deal with a new US partner when he presented at Shark's Den and made a deal for 5% of the business. His company has grown by 50% per year and he hopes to have gross revenue of \$20,000,000 in 2015.

Morgan is a resident of Nanaimo and has overcome several challenges in his teen years, which includes becoming a father at 15 and later adopting his younger brother. Morgan wants to give back to his community. He promotes getting involved in charities to his employees. The employees vote to decide which charity will get \$3,000 (which was a matching effort with employees). Morgan saved Heritage Days in Nanaimo by being the key sponsor for Heritage Days with a \$20,000 donation.

- SCHOLARSHIPS to LOCAL STUDENTS. 100%
 of the local clubs we have visited to date give
 scholarships to students in their local schools and
 where they exist also in the colleges. Would not it
 be great if we had a total value for all the local
 scholarships in our district! It has to be in the hundreds of thousands of dollars.
- Many clubs honor their speakers by presenting a book to a local program for Literacy for young students. I am always honored to sign the book given in my honor.
- Many clubs provide dictionaries for the third grade students in their service area. This is a real printed dictionary, not an online dictionary.
- We have clubs who provide mentoring for challenged students at their local school. What a concept, help those struggling students when they are early in their education experience so they can succeed.
- We have clubs whose members read to the young students to trigger their interest in reading.
- Gig harbor rotary members are encouraged to spend just one hour each week mentoring and encouraging young students who are challenged.

- The Bremerton rotary's aVid program is outstanding. In their class of 2015 all 24 of the students in the mentoring program are college bound receiving over one million dollars of scholarship offers. The Rotarians spend just an hour a week with the assigned student. You can visit the House of Friend-

- Some clubs provide laptops for students who can't afford their own.
- Many clubs including my own Chehalis Rotary provide back to school backpacks loaded with appropriate school supplies so the disadvantaged and homeless students can begin school on the same level as your and my children and grandchildren will begin school.
