

Classification Talks: Eric Brand, Derek Lewis and Moe Lessan

Douglas Anderson introduced the speakers-the topic commonly called "Baby Talks", I personally was expecting someone to talk about Prenatal Care. However, this was an opportunity to learn about some of our most recent members. All three of our most recent members to the club spoke about varied and very colorful lives often involving living and working half way around the world in far more difficult lifestyles than we have here in Nanaimo.



Eric Brand was our first speaker. Eric is 26 years old and was born in Medicine Hat. He went to boarding school from grade 7 to 12 and to University of Alberta to start a degree in

Psychology. He left school to join the army and he was stationed in Afghanistan. Eric left the army on medical leave and on his return from his tour of duty started drinking heavily and ran into trouble and ended up in Edgewood. Eric said on July 25, 2012 his life really began when he was discharged from Edgewood and began his road to recovery.

Eric owns his own medical support company—Tactical Medical Services, providing tactical medical services and private paramedics overseas. Eric met Ashley on January, 2013 and this summer he bought a 27 foot sale boat. He has worked as a healthcare administrator for St. John Ambulance and volunteered for the BC summer games, and worked on setting up members for Canada games among many other volunteer activities. Both he and Ashley are planning on joining the Marine Search and Rescue.



Derek Lewis's life was also influenced by the Military. Derek's dad grew up on a diary farm in Nova Scotia and ended up joining the armed forces and was stationed in Comox where he met

Derek's mother. Derek was born in 1970 and when he was 3¹/₂ months his family moved to PEI. As he was growing up his family was stationed at eight different armed forces bases from one end of Canada to the other. In Cold Lake Alberta, Derek can remember going to school accompanied by armed security since it was during the Cold war. Derek graduated from high school in Comox. In 1990 he went to UBC to start a Science degree and ended up in BCIT in Financial Management. Derek has always been interested in construction—it is his passion currently he is working on tearing out his bathroom. When he was 26 years old he renovated

Vancouver Island Conference Centre NANAIMO, B.C. a condo in Kitsilano, Vancouver extensively –living with the whole house on stilts at one point in time and improving the value from \$400,000 to \$1 million dollars.

While he was in Vancouver, he began working at the Edelweiss Credit Union, drawn by the pay he advanced through the banking system and 12 years later he was still there. In 1995, he met his future wife Kim and ten years later he proposed to her after a vacation to Cuba. Derek had everyone laughing when he described his trials with conceiving his first child. His daughter was born in St. Paul's and his son was born in 2012. For Derek having kids and a family has been a life-changer for the better. He currently works at Coastal Community Credit Union as a Senior Business Relationship Manager. He has



interest in hockey, softball, golf, tennis, travel and woodworking. Last but not least, our newest mem-

ber to Rotary, **Moe Lesson**. *Moe you will*

have to excuse me if I got your life all jumbled up –the things that stuck in my mind are –you swallowed a frog, drank camel pee and that you are a "good catch but not a keeper". The rest is a blur but I will do my best.

Moe was born on April 10, 1968 in Tiran. He has one sister. His father was an accountant and after the 1978 revolution he went into business for himself. Moe remembers at age 5 learning about Cost Accounting from his father.

To avoid the army, he left Tiran through a human smuggling chain it took him 13 days of travel involving many modes of transportation including walking and camel to final arrive at Pakistan. During his trip he went $1\frac{1}{2}$ days without water but finally ended up at a town by the Indian Ocean where he ended up in jail for a brief time. A year later he found another smuggler who could get him to either Canada or the US with false passports. He arrived in September, 1998 and in Nanaimo on September, 2006. In Canada he went to UBC and SFU and specialized in languages. Almost finished his studies he had to go back to Iran, it took him almost a year to get back. When he came back he went into business selling businesses and also doing accounting and tax consulting. In 1987 he became a realtor and later obtained his mortgage broker's license. His focus is as a broker for businesses and he loves it. He currently works for DTZ Nanaimo. Moe has been married four times - hence the term, "a good catch but not a keeper".
