




Lost Lake in the centre of North Nanaimo. Photo by Ross White

Classification Talks by New Members

Our presentation today included initiation talks from new members **Denise Wittkoski**, **Behzad Forghani Targhi**, **and John Woychuck. Lila Tanner** introduced each of the speakers, and provided a brief biography.



Denise Wittkoski spoke first and began by discussing her love for writing, which led to university education in

journalism, and a career in advertising work. Denise has spent

her working career exploring many areas of advertising, with a special focus on video production. Being also an extensive traveler, her work and interests have led her on excit-



ing journeys around the world, and into journalism and advertising projects in many different areas. As a communication specialist, she regularly works for corporate, educational and non-profit groups, and she was invited to Rotary by **Lila Tanner** while working with one of her non-profit clients.

Discussing the incredible advance in technology, Denise related that when she first began, a video recording machine was the size of a table, enormously heavy, and took an entire crew to operate. In just a handful of years, this has reduced to handheld units with excellent recording capabilities.

Behzad Forghani Targhi was the next member to



speak, and he began by mentioning his appreciation for his two wonderful daughters and compassionate wife. He then apologized for his accent and lack of presentation expertise; however, it quickly became apparent that this was just for show, as he proved to be an excellent speaker.

Behzad has recently immigrated to Canada from Iran, together with his family.

His life and professional career is varied and expansive, ranging from vegetable farmer to mushroom farmer, to engineer and owner of his own firm, to project manager and finally to financial advisor with SunLife Financial in Nanaimo.

Behzad completed his engineering training in Iran and ran a firm there specializing in irrigation, reservoirs, and dam design before making his way to Nanaimo by way of Australia.

Behzad was born in Mashad, which has a population of 2.5 million. He was born just before the revolution, and has two sisters and a brother. His oldest sister is working Swe-

den on post-doctoral research in microbiology, his brother lives in Burnaby, and his youngest sister lives in Iran. Behzad's journey to his current position in Nanaimo involved working several jobs, completing certification for financial planning, and taking a position with SunLife. He is very happy to be a Rotarian, and hopes to make the list of "25 most successful immigrants".

John Woychuck was our final speaker. John has joined



the club as part of the first corporate membership, which allows multiple people under a single membership. This one was through Vancouver Island University, and he joined along with two other staff. He spoke about his working career, and the path he's taken to achieve it. John used three themes that he feels illustrate his mindset: travel and culture, writing, and advising/coaching.

John was born and raised in Brandon, MB, and began to travel immediately after finishing high school, spending first 6 months in Mauritius, and then 6 months in Banff, before completing a B.A. at the University of Manitoba. John says that he thinks he can speak Chinese, but isn't completely sure, and usually with more confidence after a few drinks.

After Taiwan, John returned to Canada and completed a second degree in education with the University of Calgary. He worked a number of volunteer and paid positions, and is now teaching with VIU and managing the MBA program. He loves teaching and counselling, and finds it very fulfilling to see the light bulb when a student catches on.

The third theme of writing has always been a hobby and passion. John runs a blogging side business and is currently writing a book on careers. His goals for the future are to continue working with VIU students, finish his book, and invest his time and energy in Nanaimo.
