

Bob Fenty introduced the day's speakers: all visiting or returning Rotary exchange students. First up was **Yusuke**

Wada who had spent a year in Nanaimo as a Rotary exchange student three years ago. He has since graduated high school and is now at university studying economics. Yusuke said he made this return visit to Canada to satisfy his craving for Tim Hortons, to see his Canadian friends



again and to say thank you again to his host families. He said his year as a Rotary exchange student was a great experience that he will not forget.

Bas Bakker is our inbound exchange student who arrived one week ago from Holland. He said he already likes Vancouver Island and has a bucket list of things he would like to do, including whale watching, visiting Victoria, and seeing hockey and soccer matches. Bas is a keen soccer player and is hoping to get a regular spot with a local club. He is also hoping that school will start soon



Rebecca Miller is a returning exchange student who spent July with a family in Turin, Italy. She is currently hosting her Rotary "sister", Sophia Gnudi who was also present. Rebecca said she had a wonderful time getting to

know the host family who were very kind, and visiting famous cities including Rome and Venice. Sophia loves nature and the outdoors and has visited Tofino, Whistler, Parksville and Coombs. She loves the open spaces and the wonderful sunsets we experience.



Morgan Brimacombe recently returned after spending a year in Prague in the Czech Republic. She stayed with three host families, made lots of friends with the

host families as well as the other foreign Rotary exchange students. She fell in love with Prague and would go back any time. She was particularly impressed with the architecture (new and old) and the atmosphere in the old town. Morgan had opportunities to travel and explore extensively, including visiting Slovakia several times. She did several school trips including camping, kayaking and staying in a concentration camp. Before returning home, all 50 plus Rotary exchange students went on a hectic two week bus tour all over Europe.

She had to become quite fluent in Czech as all her classes were in that language. She found the teaching style to be quite different from what she was accustomed to (more like a university with lectures, not lessons). The subject matters were more advanced and taught with fewer resources than in Canada.

Morgan ended by saying her stay in Prague was the best year of her life and thanked Rotary for making it possible.

Debbie Narver thanked the students for telling us about their experiences and plans. She said we hope to see much more of Bas during his year here. In keeping with club tradition, she presented each of the speakers with a Rotary pen.

GARY C.K. HUANG PRESIDENT 2014-15 SEPTEMBER 2014

One of the great privileges of being president of Rotary International is having the chance to visit so many parts of the Rotary world. Usually I travel to participate in Rotary events; speak at Rotary clubs, conferences, and institutes; and encour-

age Rotarians in their service. But as president, I am responsible for all branches of the Rotary family. This means that it is also my privilege to support the service of Rotary's youngest generations: our Rotaractors, Interactors, Rotary Youth Exchange students, and Rotary Youth Leadership Awards participants.

When I see the work Rotarians do, I am always impressed, always excited, and always inspired. When I see the work of our New Generations, I am all of this – and frequently I am surprised as well. Not by the quality of their work – for I have learned to expect great things from them – but by the creativity and ingenuity of their thinking. I look at what they have done and think not just "What a great job!" but "What a great idea!" Because every generation sees the world in a unique way, and every individual has a unique point of view. Faced with the same problems, we arrive at different solutions. This is why, in Rotary, our diversity – of culture, language, expertise, gender, and age – is our strength.

Their perspective is a valuable contribution to the world of Rotary service, and it is one that we should all encourage and support. Just as they are learning from us, so should we be learning from them.

The young people who are serving in Rotaract and Interact, and participating in Youth Exchange and RYLA today, are the Rotarians of tomorrow. When we support them, we are supporting the future of our entire organization. We are helping to train the men and women who will be the club presidents, district governors, RI directors, and RI presidents of tomorrow.
