COMPTER SECURITY IN THE 21ST CENTURY HINT: 1234 IS NOT A GOOD PASSWORD!

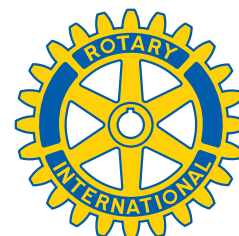

In his free time, he continues development on a software project called the Cyber Security Scoring Engine Framework, which is a utility meant to assist with building, running, and scoring competitions similar to the CCDC.
