To understand the principles of Rotary it is helpful to know the **Rotary Four-way Test:** "Of the things we think, say or do -

- 1. Is it the truth?
- 2. Is it fair to all concerned?
- 3. Will it build goodwill and better friendships?
- 4. Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

Core values of Rotary International are Service, Fellowship, Diversity, Leadership and **INTEGRITY.**

The Objects of Rotary:

The Objects of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular to encourage and foster:

- 1. The development of acquaintances as an opportunity for service.
- 2. High ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition of worthiness of all useful occupations and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occuption as an opportunity to serve society.
- 3. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business and community life.
- 4. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world of fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

The exact local origins of this award are lost to the vagaries of time but records show the first Central Alberta Integrity Awards were presented in 1994 and awards have continued every year since. A lisiting of recent recipients is presented in the back of this program.

Integrity Award Criteria

The general guidelines/criteria for Integrity awardees paint a picture of admirable virtues in non-Rotarians as interpreted by individual clubs. Sometimes these are referred to as those unsung heroes deserving recognition and who:

- 1. Have a lifestyle consistent with the Rotary four-way test. (Considerate)
- 2. Live with purpose expressing principles widely accepted in the community. (Representative)
- Take a stand without concern for personal loss or reputation. (Brave)
- 4. Pursue their integrity without need for recognition within the community. (Selfless)
- 5. Have made a personal contribution to the region warranting special recognition. (Generous)

Through this initiative, Ian not only honors the memory of those lost to suicide but also raises vital funds for Wounded Warriors Canada, ensuring crucial mental health programs and services reach those who need them most.

Whether navigating the complexities of frontline work or savoring moments with his cherished family, lan embodies resilience, compassion, and the unwavering belief that even in life's darkest moments, there is light to be found.

This realization sparked the inception of Basically Babies, an organization dedicated to supplying families in extreme need with infants' first-year wardrobes and necessities.

From its humble beginnings of monthly meetings to assemble clothing packages, Basically Babies has evolved into a beacon of hope for 1,000 families annually. Their signature layettes, thoughtfully presented in laundry baskets, contain over 100 items crucial for an infant's first year-ranging from sleepers and blankets to snowsuits and storybooks. Partnering with a diverse network of charitable organizations and social service agencies, Basically Babies ensures these essentials reach those who need them most.

Central to the organization's success is the generosity of donors and the dedication of volunteers. Gently worn clothing, meticulously sorted, laundered, and ironed, forms the bulk of layette contents, providing parents with the means to dress their babies appropriately throughout the year.

Janet's leadership has been instrumental in Basically Babies' journey. From navigating cramped basements to securing an expansive 700,000-square-foot warehouse, she has steered the organization's growth with vision and tenacity. Under her guidance, Basically Babies has not only expanded its reach to Calgary but also become a registered charity, cementing its commitment to serving communities with compassion and dignity.

Her advocacy extends across various platforms, from speaking engagements at TedX, rallies, conferences, and community meetings to engagements with professional organizations, universities, and all levels of government.

Recently, Petra's advocacy took her to the global stage, where she represented Canada at the United Nations Commission on Narcotic Drugs in Vienna. Her presence on the Canadian Delegation underscores the significance of her work and her dedication to driving meaningful policy changes at the international level.

If ever anyone embodied the principles of Rotary, without being a Rotarian, it would be Jason Gregor.

Known mainly as a Sports Radio broadcaster on TSN1260 for the last 20 years, then more recently on the newly launched Sports1440, Jason is a reliable and informative source for sports news and opinions for thousands of fans in the Edmonton area. Jason has always presented the topic of the day on his shows, with honesty, fairness, insight, and in-depth research, developing a loyal fan base that can trust him and his opinions. This really is a true representation of Rotary's Four-Way Test!

However, Jason has another very unique side to his story: he is a world class philanthropist. Inspired by his father, he used his broadcasting platform to support charities that produced high impact with low administrative costs. In 2011 he created his "Month of Giving": in December he uses donated goods and services, and simple donation "asks" to support local Edmonton charities. This initiative has raised over \$1.5 million. In 2014 he started the Jason Gregor Foundation, and so far, he has raised over \$3 million.

In addition to charities, Jason donates suits to graduating high school young men in need, via his Gregor's Grads Program. In 2018 he created the Jason Gregor Radio and Television Bursary awarded annually to a third semester NAIT student. And, it is not just the money. Jason insists on meeting with the students his bursary helps, adding that human touch. In 2023, Jason Gregor was awarded an Honorary Bachelor of Technology from NAIT.



So far, he has provided over \$30,000 in much needed funds to Brightview.
