These are Rotary's guiding principles. Understanding these puts your club experience into perspective and adds meaning to being a part of Rotary.

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

FIRST: The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;

SECOND: High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

THIRD: The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;

FOURTH: The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

A Few Interesting Facts About Our Club



- The Swan City Rotary Club of Grande Prairie (#22868) was the second Rotary Club in the City of Grande Prairie
- The club was chartered on June 15, 1985
- The first Club President was Ken Sargent in 1985/1986
- The first exchange student was Tine Nielsen from Denmark, who arrived in August 1985
- The first female Rotarian in our club was Arlene Miller, who joined in March 1996
- The first female Club President was Eve Tollenaar in 2009/2010

Today, the Swan City Rotary Club is the largest club within District 5370, which includes over 60 clubs. We currently have a membership of approximately 120 people, ranging in age from 25 to 87 years young! We have a very dynamic club and are very proud of our long history of service in Grande Prairie.

Our Rotary meetings are held once per week, on Wednesdays, starting at 12:15pm at the Holiday Inn at 9816 – 107 street or online via the zoom link on our Club Calendar. When you enter the main doors of the hotel, turn to your left and follow the hallway to the meeting room at the end.

You will receive a text each week asking if you <u>WILL NOT</u> be attendance in-person for the following weeks meeting. If you do not reply with a no, the charge for that week's meeting including a meal will automatically be added to your bill. Also, if you plan on bringing any guests to a meeting, you must let the Club Administrative Assistant know a WEEK AHEAD to ensure they are added to the meal count.

#### Club Fees

Members can attend weekly club meetings in any combination of online and in-person. Currently, fees for members of the Swan City Rotary Club include the following (subject to change) invoiced monthly:

- Meeting Fees: \$6.00 Club Fee, \$2.00 Convention Fund Fee and \$17.00 (including tax) Meal Fee are charged per meeting (meal fee is reducing as of July 2024)

**PLEASE NOTE:** The Club Fee and Convention Fund Fee will be charged every week regardless of attendance. The Meal Fee will apply to any meeting you attend in-person or if you did not respond with a NO to the attendance text. If a meeting is cancelled by the board, these fees do not apply for that week's meeting.

• Optional Fees: Items such as donations to the Rotary Foundation (Paul Harris Contributions) and club activities such at the Changeover Golf Tournament, etc., paid as per the specific instructions of the item.

The club Executive Administrator will email out invoices for payment, as well as statements for outstanding payments due, so please ensure that the contact information for whomever is responsible for the payment is current so you receive them. Invoices are due upon receipt unless otherwise noted.

# **Member Expectations**

As a member of the Swan City Rotary Club, you are encouraged to attend as many regular meetings, whether online or in-person, as possible to be engaged with the club and stay informed. We do not have a minimum attendance requirement to be a member, but



your Rotary experience is what you make of it so attending the meetings, club activities, etc. is a great way to get engaged with the club.

We are also a service club, so as a member you are asked to volunteer for events and activities that take place throughout the year.

We recognize that attending regular meetings can sometimes be challenging with our busy work/life/family schedules, so if you miss a regular meeting, there are other ways you can make-up those missed. Some examples are:

- Watch the recording of a meeting or attend a meeting at another club
- Attend a convention
- Volunteer for a shift at a service event such as kettles, lottery ticket sales, etc.

Once you have completed one of the above make-up activities, please let Pam know which meeting you are using the make-up for and what you did for the make-up. For example, if you missed the meeting on November 10 and you did a ticket shift on November 26, then let Pam know this information for her records. You can also bank your make-ups to be used for a future missed meeting. We ask that all make-ups be submitted by the end of the quarter (September, December, March and June) so we can make sure none are missed.

And finally, as a special thank you to our members, we present those who have 100% attendance for the Rotary year with a pin in celebration of their milestone. We have many members who have had perfect attendance for every year they have been in Rotary!

## Stay Informed

When you join the Swan City Rotary Club, you will complete a New Member Enrollment Form, which is entered into the Rotary International system as well into our ClubRunner website. Once this is completed, you will have access to many sources of information about our Club, our District and Rotary International. It is important that we have the most current contact information in the system, so if at any point after your enrollment your contact, employment or billing info changes, please log into your account on our ClubRunner website, go to Member Login, and update your information or you can send the updates to Pam.

It is also important to understand how to locate any resources you may need from Rotary International, our Rotary District #5370 as well as our Club. You will be

assigned a login for our ClubRunner website by Pam when you join our club, and you will need to set up an account for Rotary International under the My Rotary section. Please record your login information somewhere safe as you will need it throughout your Rotary journey. More information about how to complete these steps are covered below.

It is important to keep your contact information current as you will receive communications via email in regards to news from Rotary International, our District and our Club, as well as a member magazine from Rotary International in the mail. This app can be downloaded to your phone for quick access to club information such as your attendance, meeting information, contact info, etc. You will use the same login information as the ClubRunner website.

This website contains all things Rotary. If you are looking for any information about Rotary in general, this is the site to check out. No login is required to look at general information.

This website contains information that is specific to your RI Membership, such as your donations to the Rotary Foundation, as well as a massive amount of training

in many areas of Rotary. A login is required for access to this site. As a new member, you can set up your own login, just follow the steps. If you are missing any information to login, check your account on ClubRunner.

#### **New Member Activities**



As a new member in the Swan City Rotary Club, there are a number of activities which you will be required to complete. These include Induction, Classification Speech, Fireside and participation on the Greeting Committee. These activities will engage you with Rotary and our club and will answer a lot of questions you may have. These activities should be completed within the first 3-6 months of joining.

Induction
Once a month we induct all our new members officially into our club. At that time, your sponsor will give a brief introduction to the club and you will be presented with your Rotary Pin, as well as your Membership Certificate, Objects

of Rotary and 4-Way Test plaques.

Classification Speech

This is a short presentation to introduce yourself to the club. You will be asked to

speak about yourself, your family (if you so choose), your career and why you wanted to join Rotary. Speeches will be scheduled so you will have time to prepare.

#### Fireside

This is an evening event held for new Rotarians and their spouses, generally held at a past president's home or arranged location. At the fireside, some of our past presidents and other long-time members share information about Rotary and can answer questions you may have about the club, etc. It is also a fellowship opportunity to allow you to get to know some other Rotarians in a smaller setting then at a regular meeting.

### **Greeting Committee**

All new members are automatically placed onto the Greeting Committee. Typically, you will be a member of the Greeting Committee for at least your first year of membership. The shifts rotate so you will not be working every meeting. As a Greeter you will help to set up the meeting room and then greet each Rotarian as they come in with "Welcome to Rotary". This is an excellent way to meet our members and learn their names.

Once all of the above activities are completed, you will be presented with your Hat Trick (yes... you get an official Rotary Hat) in commemoration of their completion.

#### **Areas of Service**

Rotary would be just another club, but our focus is the component of Service. Our motto as Rotarians is Service Above Self, and there are five Areas of Service which we focus on. They are Club Service, Vocational Service, Community Service, International Service and Youth Services.

Club Service relates to the first part of the Object of Rotary; the development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service. This area focuses on the things we do in our club to help it function successfully. This includes items such as meeting attendance, fellowship and club events, our club Facebook page and website, and of course bringing great speakers and programs to our weekly meetings.

Vocational Service involves using our professional and business talents and resources to serve others. This area highlights the fact that Rotary was founded on the concept of networking and doing business with other Rotarians in addition to servicing society.

Community Service refers to the activities we undertake as Rotarians which improve our communities and serve the needs of those who may need our assistance. The projects undertaken in our local community are opportunities for every member to exemplify the Rotary motto "Service Above Self".

International Service relates to our unique opportunity and ability to impact the world through humanitarian service in other countries, to undertake projects designed to assist those in developing countries, to support relief and recovery efforts in the wake of disaster and to participate in programs that advance international understanding, goodwill and peace. Rotary also offers each of our members the ability to connect with people from all parts of the world through the International Convention, friendship exchanges and fellowships.

Youth Services relates to the positive change implemented by youth and young adults through leadership development activities, involvement in community and international service projects. There are also exchange programs that enrich and foster world peace and cultural understanding. This area also includes programs and projects involving young people under the age of 30, such as leadership and ethics training programs, Interact and Rotaract clubs and many more.

Each year our membership will be asked to complete our Choices Survey. This survey describes the many different committees and activities that our club does during the year and provides some information about our Board roles. Your answers help the Board Directors fill lead roles for some of our committees and gauge interest in our activities. We also ask that our members commit to at least one ticket sales shift per lottery, one kettle shift and one meal service per year. Please take the time to review the five Areas of Service and the following club events and activities list for more information.
