
A Rotary Project to Assist Teachers and Community Leaders in Rural Rwanda

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Teacher Training Workshops at the Rambo Hub School

The third and fourth teacher training workshops of the Right to Read Rwanda Project took place at the Rambo Hub School between November 24th and December 5th, 2014. The Rambo Primary School is located outside of Rubavu (formerly Gisenyi), near the small villages of Rambo and Rubano, perched on a plateau above the Bralirwa Brewery (Brassieres et Limonadieres du Rwanda), with a spectacular view of Lake Kivu, surrounding countryside, and on a clear day the volcanic outline of Nyiragongo in the Democratic Republic of Congo.



The 74 participants of the first workshop at Rambo comprised teachers from Rambo Primary School and Muybe Secondary School, including 2 Head Teachers and the Head of the education sector within which the schools are located. The second Rambo Workshop was attended by 57 participants from a variety of other Primary and Secondary Schools in the area, including the Head Teachers from Rambo Primary and Busoro Secondary Schools.

Rambo Hub School Workshop Graduations

Graduation days at Rambo Hub School (Friday, November 28th and Friday, December 5th saw 74 and 57 proud student teachers, respectively, celebrate the receipt of their graduation certificates! Other celebration activities included an exhibition of their hand-made English story books, singing some of the songs they learned together during Circle Time at the end of each day, the receipt of a Canada Flag pin and a group photo out in front of the School overlooking Lake Kivu!





The impact or reach of the two teacher training workshops held at the Rambo Hub School is significant. On the basis of average number of 65 – 70 students being taught per year by a teacher participating in the workshops, the reach is between 8,385 – 9,030 – huge numbers with potentially very big impacts on students who will be the future leaders of Rwanda!! The impacts are even greater if you look at numbers of students taught by these same teachers over the course of several years: approximately 18,000 over two years and 40,000 over 5 years!! This compared to only 8,000 and 20,000 over the same period of time for same numbers of teachers in Canada!

Sponsorship

This Project is being funded with the support of a TRF Global Grant. Other partners include: Tools for Schools, a Canadian registered, not for profit organization established in 2000 specifically to support enhancing education in rural areas of Rwanda; and Mission of Hope Rwanda, a newly established Rwandan not for profit organization focused on improving the quality of education in rural areas of Rwanda.

The following are common responses received from student teachers by Jill Fenton during one of her exercises intended to reinforce English language vocabulary during the workshops. Students were asked to work in small groups and to brain-storm the things that are best or unique about Rwanda, with a goal of coming up with a minimum of 40 different things. The groups assigned reporters and scorekeepers, as points were assigned depending on how unique their ideas are in comparison to the other groups.
