## U.S. Consul General Visits Yellowknife Thomas Huffaker Addresses the Rotary Club of Yellowknife

YELLOWKNIFE, NT-October 11, 2006: U.S. Consul General, Thomas Huffaker, is looking forward to making his first ever trip to the Northwest Territories this week and will be sharing his excitement with the Rotary Club of Yellowknife this Thursday, October 12<sup>th</sup>, where he will be welcomed as a guest speaker.

"I'm delighted to make my first visit to the Northwest Territories so early in my tenure," remarks Huffaker. "I'm especially looking forward to meeting the many men and women in this important and unique part of Canada."

Mr. Huffaker's address to Yellowknife Rotarians will focus on the United States' relations with Canada and the Northwest Territories. Mr. Huffaker assumed his duties as Consul General for the Calgary Consular District, encompassing Alberta, Saskatchewan and the Northwest Territories, on August 14, 2006.

"I know this visit to Yellowknife will be the first of many journeys I make to the Territories to maintain the important connections between the United States and the people of Canada's north," adds Huffaker.

## **Backgrounder:**

## **Tom Huffaker**

Consul General of the United States of America Alberta, Saskatchewan and the Northwest Territories

The State Department selected Tom Huffaker as Consul General for Alberta, Saskatchewan and the Northwest Territories in the fall of 2005. He arrived in Calgary to take up his duties on August 14, 2006. Tom was honored by his selection and looks forward to his role in furthering the already extraordinarily close partnership between the United States in Canada, with which we maintain the world's largest bilateral trade, energy and agricultural relationships. Western Canada's role as our largest foreign supplier of oil, gas and uranium is deeply appreciated in the United States. These economic relationships complement our very close political and security links and strong bonds of family and friendship all across our common border.

For the past three years, Tom served as Deputy Minister Counselor for Economic Affairs at the United States Embassy in Moscow. While there, his focus was on U.S.-Russian energy ties, Russian accession to the World Trade Organization, and management and reorganization of one of the State Department's largest economic sections.

Tom spent four years as Energy and Environment Officer at the U.S. Embassy in Ottawa (1999-2003), which followed two years in Washington (1997-1999) as Chief Economist in the State Department's Office of Russian Affairs. He previously served in Moscow (1994-1996) in the Economic Section. Tom was a Corporate Fellow in California with Sun Microsystems from 1996-1997. Earlier assignments included the Political Military Affairs Bureau of the State Department in Washington, DC (1990-1992), Mumbai, India (1988-1990) and Belgrade, Yugoslavia (1986-1988). Tom practiced law in California from 1982-1985.

Tom is a graduate of the University of California, Davis and the University of California, Hastings College of the Law. He is married to Claire Fried Huffaker, a former U.S. diplomat. They have a son in middle school and a daughter in high school. Avid skiers and lovers of the outdoors, the entire family embraces the life Western Canada has to offer.
