Program: "youturn" A youth support system-Cathy Hay and Shirley Rocque

Intro

Presentation

Dirk Keenan introduced our guest speakers Cathy Hay and Shirley Rocque.

Cathy Hay started the presentation by giving a chilling story of human trafficking in which she had almost been a victim. **Shirley Rocque** continued the presentation telling us 'youturn" counsels youth and their families who are or may become involved with the justice system. It is a non-profit organization that has be around for 30 years servicing vulnerable youth 12 to 25 years old. At present youturn has 11 board members and is always looking for more. It provides a multitude of programs like **A Different Street Supportive Housing.** - affordable housing for homeless or unstable young men 16-21. **Collaborative Problem-Solving-** parent group therapy addressing challenging behavior present by our youth. **Community Support Team-**Community-based services aimed at prevention or limiting a

young person's staying in custody. **Intensive Support and Supervision Program**-Community-based program designed to provide an alternative to custody for young persons found guilty of a criminal offense that have a mental health disorders. **John Bosco Achievement Centre**-educational program for youth who have been or are involved in the criminal justice system and who are working towards high school credits or employment skills. **On Point**-for youth 12-21 who are at high risk of gang involvement. **Anti-Human Trafficking Program**-young people 12-25 who are vulnerable or are survivors of human trafficking. **Youth in Transition** -support to youth for their successful transition out of the child welfare system to adulthood. **youturn** face budgetary constraints but focuses on helping as many youth as possible. Answering **Peter Fisher** our speaker said that youturn had supported youth involved in "all kinds" of offenses. **Merv Letts** was told referrals came from the youth themselves and other organizations. **Andrew Young** learned that Cathy had been saved by routine border patrol inspection of the back of the transport truck in which she was being carried. **Jim Maxwell** mentioned that significantly larger school classes tended to have more challenged youth than normal classes. **Don Butler** asked if youturn dealt with cultlike gang youth recruitment techniques like those reported in CBC Uncover's *Escaping NXIUM* but was told it did not. **Bill Rolph** appreciated the info on human trafficking. **Dave Morton** thanked the speakers for an interesting presentation and presented them with the usual gifts and certificate for a donation to End Polio.
